





Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the draft 2023 Montana Gray Wolf Conservation and Management Plan. Science, policy and public perception pertaining to wolf management have advanced significantly over the years prompting new and different management methods and goals. We appreciate the state's intent to evaluate and revise its approach.

Founded in 1983, Bear Creek Council (BCC) is a local, all-volunteer, grassroots organization working to conserve and protect the integrity of the environment and community at the north entrance of Yellowstone National Park. We have had a strong and continuous presence in wolf management decisions since wolf reintroduction ~30 years ago. We advocate for management that encourages and celebrates wild wolves. Wolves should be valued as native wildlife that are inextricably linked to the health of the wild ecosystem and the prosperity of Montana's economy. The EIS and resulting management plan need to reflect this fact.

In this context, we urge the state to demonstrate stewardship befitting of a valued, native wildlife species. In the perception of people from around the world, wolf management in

our state hinges on choices the state now endeavors to make. Whether the views of these "outsiders" are a consideration or not, satisfying Montana residents for whom conservation of wildlife is held in trust is obligatory.

Previous draft management plans for other species, like grizzly bears, were noticeably different in their tone in describing perils to the species and its various challenges and opportunities. This document strikes a decidedly more pessimistic tone treating wolves as mostly a problem while failing to fully articulate the tremendous value wolves have brought to the state, while failing to acknowledge the greatest challenge wolf conservation faces, which is that management has been hijacked by politicians professing misinformed ideologies while serving special interests. Until this fact is acknowledged and excoriated there is no credible foundation for transparent and science-based management. We have witnessed a notable decline in conservation standards applied to wolves since 2021, eroding public trust and expectations for a balanced management process.

The remainder of our comments describe specific concerns about the plan's adherence to actual scientific underpinnings and ethical management practices.

- 1. The number, 450, for wolves seems largely arbitrary and indefensible as any kind of goal. It is ill-defined and not supported by rationale. Due to multiple factors and compounding errors, iPOM severely overestimates Montana's wolf population. It is likely there are around 450 wolves in the state (Crabtree et al 2023), not 1100 suggested in the 2023 Wolf Plan (Figure 2, p. 26). We urge the state to not have a numeric goal for wolves and focus instead on qualitative conservation measures that ensure a healthy, robust wolf population throughout occupiable habitat.
- 2. On population estimation, the iPOM model as currently parameterized is inadequate. Based on multiple untested assumptions, it compounds errors to arrive at unreliable estimates. The inputs, parameters, and assumptions need to be tested vigorously before the model can be used with confidence.
- 3. We need a new and earnest assessment of attitudes toward wolves among ALL people in Montana. A legitimate survey by an independent entity should be initiated as part of this process. The DEIS relies on past reports that demonstrate in some cases little more than, "among people that don't like wolves, there is little tolerance for wolves." This bias in favor of some stakeholders skews management at the expense of other legitimate stakeholders.
- 4. The economic section is woefully outdated and inaccurate, missing nearly the entirety of the value of wolves to bringing visitors to much of our state, not just the Yellowstone corridor where it is demonstrably 'big business.' Wolves may not be valued this way in every community, but certainly wolves are a significant reason why most visitors visit where they visit (i.e., national parks and wilderness areas). Apply the most recent scientific economic data on wolf tourism, over \$82 million of sustainable annual income for Montana's economy (U. of Montana ITRR & RRC Assoc., 2022)
- 5. The need for a better balance in implementing the intended legislative mandate. Reducing the population has been achieved, now the department has to define the sustainability goal, also intended by the legislature. New permitting and harvest strategies should be considered to address low hunter success while providing sustainability for the wolf population.

Our overarching expectation for wolf management does occur in DEIS: "The preferred alternative would allow for implementation of varying wolf management strategies that address different local population objectives. For example, an area with ungulate population concerns may benefit from liberal wolf harvest regulations while an

area that values ecotourism may benefit from conservative wolf harvest strategies. As a result, local benefits may differ across the state" (DEIS, p. 30).

Sport hunting can be a significant and important part of population management for wolves, BCC does not refute that and has hunters within its membership. However, current wolf mortality across the state does not reflect this goal. The department's approach to the legislative mandate could be improved by balancing its focus on 'reduce' with its focus on 'sustainable'. The population has been reduced since the legislative mandate, as suggested by several lines of evidence (population modeling, increased effort with lower harvest, etc.). The work of the department now is to define, measure, and ensure sustainability. While difficult for all to agree on the goals of what is 'sustainable,' consider these parameters:

Montana has far more elk and elk harvest now than it did when the wolves were reintroduced three decades ago, with many elk hunting districts over objective. Similarly, wolves account for less than one tenth of one percent of confirmed livestock losses, which does not constitute a problem for the state's livestock industry. For ranchers that experience loss, there are far more efficient and effective measures directed to the local situation, rather than a blanket directive to kill more wolves everywhere. The statistics of hunter harvest should be considered—in the effort to reduce, the hunting experience has been degraded. With an abysmal success rate, sportspersons with a genuine interest in a rewarding experience face very long odds.

With other game species, the agency implements alternative harvest strategies designed to improve hunter experience and success. For prize species such as bighorn sheep, mountain goats, and moose, limited draw hunting units are implemented to permit only a few hunters for a given area. Why are wolves not prized? Employing a limited draw system for specific units will both protect wolf packs in those areas from over-harvest and improve the likelihood that hunters who draw in a lottery system will have a better experience. While much of the state could remain in the regional quota system, a half dozen units should be established in the most remote areas of public land like wildernesses and adjacent to the two national parks (i.e., WMUs 110 and 313). These areas could serve both as refuges that guard against population decline, protect crucial research studies on wolves, and at the same time, serve as hunt units with increased chances for individual hunter success.

If the state acknowledges the value of wolves to non-consumptive stakeholders in this way, it could generate significant amounts of much-needed revenue through additional wolf tags purchased in the application process for a limited-draw wolf license. This approach could potentially raise hundreds of thousands of dollars needed to accomplish the broad conservation mission of the agency, including mitigation measures, while balancing the values of a diverse array of stakeholders in wolf management.

In summary, Bear Creek Council is a local organization that advocates for preservation of wildlife populations in south-central Montana and the communities that depend on them. The often-appalling treatment of wolves, guided by cultural bias and misinformation, is an egregious case of mismanagement that can now be corrected with a new and revised approach to wolf management.

The current process needs to establish a balance of public interests among many cultures and industries, with an emphasis on the importance and value of wolves to many people in the state. Considering new science and a fresh managerial intent, we are optimistic that the current process will result in an approach that restores long-term sustainability and prosperity for both the people and wolves sharing the Montana landscape.

On behalf of the board of directors and over 1,000 professionally-licensed guide and outfitter members of the Fishing Outfitters Association of Montana (FOAM), I am writing to support the Fish and Wildlife Commission's (Commission) approval of Fish, Wildlife & Parks (FWP) planned management action to remove lake trout to benefit bull trout and kokanee salmon at Swan Lake. While FOAM supports the management and control of lake trout in the Swan Lake drainage system, we have concerns regarding bycatch and urge a complete MEPA compliance and thorough analysis of specific techniques and timing of removal efforts prior to the implementation of the full management action in 2025.

Non-native lake trout represent a substantial threat to the Swan Lake bull trout population. From 2009 to 2016, Fish, Wildlife & Parks (FWP) and other state, federal, and NGO partners conducted an eight-year experimental lake trout removal project to examine if gillnetting efforts can reduce lake trout abundance to improve bull trout and kokanee salmon populations. Results from this study demonstrated that gillnetting increased mortality of age 3 and age 4 lake trout as well as adult lake trout on known spawning areas although incidental bycatch of other species during the study was relatively low.

Since 2016, Swan Lake bull trout and kokanee abundances have declined while lake trout has increased considerably. Bull trout redd counts in 2023 revealed the lowest number on record. Additional lake trout population assessment and modeling since 2016 has shown that increased gillnetting effort to remove lake trout could positively influence bull trout abundance. FWP intends to increase lake trout monitoring in 2024 before implementing a full management action in 2025. Management action includes substantially increased gillnetting efforts to remove multiple cohorts of lake trout with concurrent monitoring of bull trout and kokanee to ensure negative impacts to bull trout abundance is minimized and to improve kokanee abundance. FWP will determine specific techniques and timing of removal efforts of this management action following MEPA compliance.

FOAM has always supported the conservation and protection of our wild cold-water fisheries while promoting and supporting the outfitting and guiding communities that are strong economic drivers throughout our state. In this light, we support the Commission approving FWP's planned management action to remove lake trout to benefit bull trout and kokanee salmon at Swan Lake.

Please see below explanation in regards to the nine mile watershed for hound hunting. The nine mile watershed will not be open for hound hunting.

I wanted to reach out to bring to your attention a misunderstanding I'm hearing about from the public regarding our current black bear proposal for the February 16th FWP Commission meeting. We have been hearing from members of the public that seem to be under the impression we are proposing to open the Ninemile valley, northwest of Missoula, to hound hunting of black bears. The Ninemile watershed is currently closed to hound hunting and would stay closed to hound hunting under the new proposal. The proposal would actually expand the area that is closed to hound hunting by closing all of Missoula County as well as a small portion of Ravalli County. See maps below showing the new proposed closure in orange vs. the current closed area in blue on the second map. I think the confusion was generated in the proposal because we crossed out the language "that includes the Ninemile watershed north of I-90". But note that we replaced this with language that closes hound hunting in that portion of BMU 200 in Missoula County which encompasses a larger area including the Ninemile.

The reason we are proposing to expand the closure is to better align the closed area to the latest grizzly bear occupancy map, which shows expanded 'occupied' grizzly habitat into Missoula and Ravalli counties.

Dear, Jeff Burrows,

I'm writing to ask that you vote NO to extending the spring black bear hunting season (actually, there should be no spring bear hunting at all).

And the hound hunting proposal expressly excludes the 9 Mile watershed, which has been my home for 13 years, from grizzly protections so that hunters can pursue black bears with hounds and train hounds in spring. No rationale is given, as far as I can see, for excluding 9 Mile, where there are certainly grizzlies. 9 Mile is simply, clumsily struck out of the regulations by some mysterious hand.

We've seen the bears, photographed the bears, even Jamie Jonkel, who is located at the FWP headquarters in Missoula, has confirmed with me personally, and at our community center meetings, that there are grizzlies here. The nine mile watershed will not be opened up, please see below explanation:

I wanted to reach out to bring to your attention a misunderstanding I'm hearing about from the public regarding our current black bear proposal for the February 16th FWP Commission meeting. We have been hearing from members of the public that seem to be under the impression we are proposing to open the Ninemile valley, northwest of Missoula, to hound hunting of black bears. The Ninemile watershed is currently closed to hound hunting and would stay closed to hound hunting under the new proposal. The proposal would actually expand the area that is closed to hound hunting by closing all of Missoula County as well as a small portion of Ravalli County. See maps below showing the new proposed closure in orange vs. the current closed area in blue on the second map. I think the confusion was generated in the proposal because we crossed out the language "that includes the Ninemile watershed north of I-90". But note that we replaced this with language that closes hound hunting in that portion of BMU 200 in Missoula County which encompasses a larger area including the Ninemile.

The reason we are proposing to expand the closure is to better align the closed area to the latest grizzly bear occupancy map, which shows expanded 'occupied' grizzly habitat into Missoula and Ravalli counties.

First of all, I would like to thank you for standing up for mule deer during the last commission meeting. I hope we will start to see an uptick in mule deer numbers with restricted doe hunting.

Although I am not in your region, the proposed statewide black bear changes will have an effect on me, so I hope you will take the time to read my comments. I am writing to you as I am concerned about some of the proposed spring black bear changes here in region 4. I am also including some documents (Region 4's recommendations and Black Bear Mortality Patterns in BMU's 411, 420, 520, and 580) that you might find valuable in guiding your decision on whether or not to support the proposed changes. The data in the documents makes a compelling case for leaving the spring bear hunting in region 4 as is. The experts who are on the ground here in region 4 recommend against expanding the spring season closure to June 15th, as female harvest is already near the established sustainable threshold. The region also recommends retaining the mandatory inspection of harvested bears.

The attached "Black Bear Mortality Patterns" document states that "Current harvest rates in the Snowies, Little Belts and Crazy Mountains are not sustainable. Even in The Beartooths, where a female harvest quota is in place, we have documented a declining population. Increased harvest, especially female harvest, will accelerate these declines. Black bears in the island mountain ranges of central Montana have one of the lowest reproductive rates of any large mammal in North America. Consequently, these populations are susceptible to over harvest and recovery from over harvest takes many years. For example, the bear population in BMU 520 was significantly over harvested in the mid-1980s and took 15 years to recover using very restrictive female harvest sub-quotas."

I will also add some of my own observations. Every spring, I put out 20+ trail cameras on National Forest lands in the island ranges in central Montana. I can tell you, based on the evidence on my trail cameras, that bear activity increases significantly in June. In fact, I get more pictures/videos of bears in June than I do the rest of the months combined. June is the breeding season when bears are moving around more and are much more visible to hunters. I have no doubt that allowing hunting until June 15th will have a significant impact on the bear harvest in region 4.

We just introduced hound hunting a few years ago and have already seen an increase in harvest as a result of that added opportunity. It is only going to gain in popularity. I feel that increasing the season length is too soon and we need more time to see the full extent to which hound hunting is going to impact spring bear harvest. It also doesn't make sense to increase harvest while getting rid of the mandatory inspection of harvested bears. Increasing harvest means that data collection would be even more important than ever. I have spoken with region 4 staff, and they have expressed that mandatory check-in is not a burden for the staff. We have already seen ballot initiatives that have led to bear hunting bans in other states. This is likely to happen here in Montana eventually. Although it may seem unlikely at this time, we have already had recent initiatives to ban trapping right here in Montana. Having reliable data to justify having a spring season will be really important in the event that a bear hunting ban initiative is ever introduced.

I would urge you not to support the proposed changes. If the proposed changes at likely to be approved, please consider making an amendment to put a quota in place for the BMU's in region 4. The quota could be based on the average yearly spring harvest over the last 10 or more years. I feel it is important to go back at least 10 years since the attached document states that the current harvest levels are not sustainable. I would also recommend amending the proposal to retain the mandatory inspection of harvested bears. Thank you for taking the time to read my comments. 

The purpose of the review is to ask the department and specifically the biologist in the region if there is a biological need to adjust the quota. As you know the commission was told today that there was not a biological or scientific reason to adjust the region 3 quota from the quota that was set during the season setting quota which had lots of public comment.

I can assure you that I read and consider all public comments when I make decisions, including opposition to proposals. You may disagree with some of the commissions decisions, but I think this commission does a good job of listening to comments and asking the department tough questions.

I agree we can coexist with wolves, but I think they must be managed, including lethal management. Dear Commissioner Burrows,

I am writing again to you to tell you of my disappointment of today's meeting. Once again different voices were not given the time to speak. Wolf killing will continue in this region and

others. Commissioner Lane asked if there had been an uptick in the number of wolves killed in this region and the answer was no. I beg to differ. From the time the season started in September to December 31st 20 wolves were killed in this region, not counting WMU 313. From January 1st to today 21 have been taken. To me that is an uptick in animals killed. Also 3 of those wolves taken in January were collared and that is troubling for several reasons. A few weeks ago it was denied by MFWP that no wolverines were trapped incidentally when it appeared in front of the environmental quality committee. Proof demonstrated that indeed 5 had been trapped, 3 of which died, and yet MFWP wants to sue to keep wolverines off the ESL. The transparency is murky at best. I will continue to distrust MFWP until they can give all stakeholders in public land a voice. Other animals have an advisory group made up of different voices. My question is why not wolves? Why is the only method for wolf management to kill wolves? Hunting for food is fine with me, but hunting to kill for sport, to help trappers, hunters, the big agriculture and livestock communities, and politicians is wrong. Ranchers, farmers, and ethical hunters can and do coexist with wolves. I have yet to hear one reason why wolves must be killed to manage them. When we kill to manage anything human or other animals, we continue to go down the path of killing and more killing and nothing is solved. I hope that I or my grandchildren never have to live in a world where there are no wild places, only those controlled by those who do so for greed and sport.

I continue to hope that all can find common ground in these issues. Thank you for letting me voice my concerns.



Dear Commissioner Burrows,

I am a 3rd generation Montanan who has lived in Region 1 for 46 years.

I am writing to you regarding your requirement to schedule a meeting that follows the regulation that the FW Commission set to meet and review "with potential for rapid inseason adjustments" when a region, such as Region 1, is within 25% of quota. That time has come. Region 1 has an unusually high quota, exceeding what was initially a lower quota until R1 Commissioner Tabor introduced an amendment to increase the wolf harvest quota that was approved by the FW Commission. According to MDFWP Montana Wolf Harvest, 103 wolves have been harvested in R1, with a quota of 131 (https://experience.arcgis.com/experience/34fbb4c9509e45959f6291965388c34 [experience.arcgis.com]). This does not include wolf deaths that have gone unreported, and/or illegally taken. Montana is rapidly reaching the 258 wolves taken in 2022/2023. Why haven't you scheduled a public meeting to review the quota in R1? If the FW Commission approved this requirement, why aren't you following it?

According to a University of MT survey (funded by MDFWP) It is apparent that you are ignoring the majority of Montanans who support a sustainable population of wolves on the landscape. The quotas that you have set are unsustainable, using questionable, outdated iPOM modeling (Crabtree, Koch, & Lele, 2023).

On January 12, 2023 a University of Montana survey found that wolf tolerance is growing for most Montanans. "In 2023, three-quarters of the general population group were tolerant or very tolerant of wolves. That's a big jump from 2017 when half the general population indicated they were tolerant. In the first survey in 2012, 41% indicated they were tolerant" (<a href="https://missoulacurrent.com/survey-wolf-tolerance/missoulacurrent/missoulacurrent/missoulacurrent/missoulacurrent/missoul

I'm writing to express my concern and disappointment in the way Montana continues to manage, or rather mismanage, their wolf populations. As a wildlife photographer and traveler, I have spent and great deal of time and money in the state of Montana and wolves are one of the primary reasons I visit. Ignoring the financial benefits that wolves bring to your state through tourism dollars is simply wrong and unfortunate. But more importantly, ignoring the ecological benefits that wolves bring to an ecosystem, of which we are apart of, is something that shouldn't be overlooked. As a keystone species, wolves regulate and maintain ecosystems in the way that they're meant to be. Without them, the negative impacts are felt at every level.

Unless wolves receive the federal protections that they deserve, I would urge Montana Fish and Wildlife to take a few things into consideration.

-Please adopt a more sound and scientific method for counting or estimating current wolf populations. The currents methods are outdated and don't utilize the best available science when determining how to sustainably and ethically manage our wildlife. Relying on hunting communities to estimate the population numbers is a flawed and simply inaccurate way of determining those numbers.

-Traps and snares are dangerous, unethical, and often come with unintended consequences. These unethical methods, which also cannot be considered fair chase in any way, have no place in the wildlife management of any species.

-Hunting wolves leads to major pack instability. This is made evident when you look at the changes within the Yellowstone National Park packs after they've been disrupted because of the loss of pack members. Eliminating wolves from a pack through hunting can also lead to a higher incidence of livestock depredation. Hunting wolves does not decrease the likelihood of livestock being taken, as you would lead people to believe.

I appreciate you taking the time to read this email. I know that you're not in an easy position of developing management plans to appease both the hunting and the non-consumptive communities. In short, please just consider the value that wolves bring to the state and the ecosystem and understand that they really do have a place on the landscape.

Thanks and hope you and the family had a good Christmas as well. Please see below timeline and explanation for the sixth wolf from 313.

The sixth wolf was taken on the evening of December 25th, Christmas Day. The hunters/trappers have 24 hours to report the take. The responsible party contacted the MRRE Call Center (out of state) after Noon on December 26th (well within the time frame required)

Wildlife staff have reviewed the audio from the call center. The caller reported to the MRRE call taker that the wolf had been taken from WMU 313. The call taker is heard to say, "So Region 3.". This is why the harvest was originally reported as being just generally in Region 3, because that's how the MRRE call taker sent it to FWP. What SHOULD have been sent to us from MRRE was what the caller told MRRE, which was specific to WMU 313. We didn't get the specifics, just the general report of a wolf taken in Region 3.

This is a training issue with MRRE that Wildlife Division has been made aware of and is addressing with urgency. It was later reported that the wolf had actually been harvested from WMU 313, at which point verification steps were initiated, research was done, and confirmation was made. The Director instructed me to send out an email to the two wardens in the North and South areas informing them personally of the pending closure of WMU 313, which I did immediately.

The regulations were followed to ensure closure is done 24 hours after notification/verification of the harvest, thus the press release from yesterday afternoon showing the closure date of today at sunset.


