Background

Season structures and hunting district boundaries are adopted biennially for most game species. This happens every other year between December and final adoptions in February. In proposing regulations to the Commission, FWP proposes adopting the existing (2013) structure except for specific changes. Proposals are based on population status and/or other circumstances.

For the 2014 and 2015 elk season structure, some of the more significant proposed changes include reducing antlerless harvest which would be more limited to private lands in Regions 2; general antlerless hunting and region-wide b-license structure in Region 4; and general antlerless/spike and region-wide B-license structure in Region 5. No changes are proposed for the elk archery permit structure.

Public Involvement Process & Results

In addition to public comment at the Dec. 12 Commission meeting, public comment ran through 5 p.m., Jan. 24, 2014. Comments and a comment summary were forwarded to the Commission.

Alternatives and Analysis

Proposals may be adopted as proposed, with adjustment, with additions, with deletions or no change from 2013 (status quo). No change would challenge the supporting justifications behind proposals.

Agency Recommendation & Rationale

Rationales for individual proposals have been included in Commission information packets and may be further articulated at the Feb. 13 Commission meeting.

Proposed Motion

I move the Commission adopt the final 2014 and 2015 Elk Hunting Seasons and Hunting Districts as presented by FWP. I also move to adopt all other portions of the previous 2012-2013 elk season regulations not affected by the Commission's actions today.
