1. **Opening - Pledge of Allegiance.** Chairman Colton called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance.
2. **Approval of the Commission Meeting Minutes of November 12, 2009.**
Action: Doll moved and Ream seconded the motion to approve the November 12, 2009 minutes. Motion carried.
3. **Approval of the November, 2009 Commission Expense Report.**

Action: Ream moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to approve the expense report as presented. Motion carried.

4. Commission Reports.

Vermillion stated that general big game season harvest in HD360 and HD362 was successful as a result of the coordinator spreading out the hunters. He participated in a well-attended meeting in Region 3 last week that quickly became a conversation about wolves.

Ream attended CAC meetings in Missoula and Kalispell that were well attended. There was a great deal of interest expressed regarding season setting, and much talk about the wolf season. He feels the wolf hunting season was successful, with good geographic distribution. A good precedent has been set from which work can continue.

Doll attended a meeting in Billings where many issues were discussed. Opening big game season on Saturday rather than Sunday brought a lot of interest. Discussion regarding weeds transported into the eastern part of the state prompted the suggestion that a certificate be issued indicating that the undersides of four wheelers and vehicles had been car washed to remove weeds, however it would be difficult to enforce. Another topic was related to the 5-week season where it was discussed to set the first three weeks as either sex, and the last two weeks as antlerless only. He said there is an increase in lion numbers outside the Bearpaws, and although the regulations cannot be changed this year, the situation needs to be addressed. He would like to see the turkey season shut down as there is no longer a population of them; there are virtually none left.

Colton said since the lion quota filled so rapidly, that situation needs to be looked into.

5. FWP Custer Avenue Land Exchange with Northwestern Energy – Proposed. Paul Sihler, FWP Lands and Outreach Section Supervisor, explained that Northwestern Energy owns a quarter-acre parcel of land adjoining twelve acres of FWP property, and FWP owns a quarter-acre parcel nearby, but not adjacent to the twelve acres. Northwestern Energy proposed a land exchange that would enable both parties to better utilize the land parcels. This proposal is basically a boundary realignment. Appraisals will be conducted, and once the parties are in agreement on the exchange details, the proposal will be published in an environmental assessment for public review and comment.

Action: Doll moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to authorize FWP to pursue the development of a land exchange proposal with Northwestern Energy involving a portion of the Department's Custer Avenue property. Motion carried.

6. Region 6 Glasgow Headquarters Property Addition – Final. Paul Sihler, FWP Lands and Outreach Section Supervisor, explained that FWP proposes to purchase a small parcel of undeveloped private land adjacent to the Region 6 Headquarters in Glasgow (.88-acres) to meet storage and parking needs. The Commission endorsed acquisition of a nearby property in September of 2005, however that particular transaction fell through in April of 2008. Shortly thereafter, FWP discussed with neighboring landowners, Carney and Fossum, the possibility of dividing off .88 of an acre from their 15-acre parcel immediately east of the FWP complex for sale to FWP. A survey and appraisal established the value as \$42,300, but the landowners have agreed to a price of \$38,000. No comments were received in response to the Environmental Assessment.

Action: Doll moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to authorize the Department to purchase the Carney/Fossum lot in Glasgow for \$38,000 as an addition to the Region 6 headquarters site. Motion carried.

7. Stipek Fishing Access Site near Glendive – Final. Paul Sihler, FWP Lands and Outreach Section Supervisor, explained that FWP proposes to purchase, as an addition to the Stipek Fishing Access Site, an adjoining 78-acre parcel owned by 777 Properties located on the Yellowstone River approximately eight miles north of Glendive. Acquisition of this property will increase the FAS to 110 acres, will double the length of Yellowstone River shoreline to over ½ mile, and will convey to FWP the remaining one-half interest in the access road. The price of the property is \$331,000, and funds will come from the Access Montana program. Nine written and several verbal comments were received in response to the Environmental Assessment. All

comments were in support of the proposal, with the exception of one that suggested acquiring a fishing access site upstream from Glendive.

Action: Colton moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to authorize the Department to purchase the 777 Properties parcel as an addition to the Stipek Fishing Access Site along the Yellowstone River north of Glendive. Motion carried.

8. MDT Hwy 83 Land Exchange on the Blackfoot Clearwater WMA – Final. Ken McDonald, FWP Wildlife Division Bureau Chief, explained that FWP proposes to exchange 19 acres on the Blackfoot-Clearwater Wildlife Management Area for a 53-acre parcel of land contiguous to the WMA owned by Montana Department of Transportation. This exchange is necessary for MDT's project to widen and realign Highway 83 between Clearwater Junction and Seeley Lake. This realignment would affect the WMA at eight specific points, consisting of the 19 acres proposed for conveyance to MDT. MDT will use the excess value, \$112,274, as bank/credit allowance for future MDT impacts on FWP lands, but will be limited to FWP Region 2 Wildlife Bureau lands that are not federally encumbered. If this proposal is denied, MDT could invoke their power of condemnation, whereby FWP would only have the option of receiving monetary compensation rather than replacement land. The 53-acre parcel would then likely sell on the open market for residential use, which would result in serious loss of habitat, and would impede wildlife movement to and from the WMA. The Environmental Assessment generated only supportive comments.

Action: Ream moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to approve FWP's recommendation to acquire 53 acres adjacent to the Blackfoot Clearwater WMA in exchange for 19 acres needed by MDT for Highway 83. Motion carried.

9. Classification Review Committee Species Classification – Proposed. Eileen Ryce, FWP Invasive Species Coordinator, explained that exotic wildlife must be classified as non-controlled, controlled, or prohibited to be legally imported into Montana. A review committee, comprised of FWP, Montana Departments of Livestock, Montana Department of Agriculture, Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services, a representative of the exotic pet trade, and a citizen with an interest in fish and wildlife evaluates petitions for classifications. Recommendations are based on environmental, ecological, public health and safety, and economic impacts caused by the animal if it is released or escapes from captivity, and on the ability to control and contain the animal in captivity. Prohibited animals used for medical experimentation must also receive approval.

The pet industry has now submitted a petition to classify the Eritrea clawed frog (*Xenopus clivii*), the Cameroon volcano frog (*Xenopus amieti*), and the Hermit crab (*Coenobita sp.*) as non-controlled. The ability of survival if these animals were turned loose is very low, and there is no evidence that any of them would cause harm to the environment or public safety.

Moody asked if any adverse comments had been received, and if the process includes outside peer review.

Ryce replied that the comment period does not open until these proposals are approved. The two letters petitioning these species were submitted from the pet trade. The classification committee is a peer group who will also solicit additional information from outside sources if needed. Any animals imported into Montana require a permit from the Department of Livestock for importation.

Moody said he does not see the importation of species into Montana to be economically feasible. He feels one more layer of review from outside sources is necessary; perhaps by a scientific body outside of Montana.

Dave Risley, FWP Fish & Wildlife Administrator, said the Committee conducts intensive reviews while following stringent protocols. Montana's cold weather also prevents the propagation of many species. This is a nationwide issue.

Colton stated that Eileen Ryce and Tim Feldner, FWP Wildlife Permit Manager, have guided the Committee, and they and the Commission have been extremely conservative. Many species have been limited already. He is comfortable with the direction the Department and Commission have taken.

Ream asked if they come from captive facilities. If animals from other countries are considered endangered, Montana should not import them.

Feldner said the endangered species regulations apply only to wild species. These particular animals are captive bred out of Florida.

Action: Ream moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to approve the proposed classification of exotic species as recommended by the classification review committee.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment. There was none.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

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Director Maurier recognized Harold Wentland for his 42 years of service to FWP. Wentland has done a great job, and he will take a lot of institutional knowledge with him when he retires at the end of the year.  
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10. 2010 Non-Resident Combination License Annual Rule Amendment – Final. Hank Worsech, FWP License Bureau Chief, stated that the Variable-Priced Licensing Advisory Council met in Helena in August to prepare fee recommendations for 2010 outfitter-sponsored licenses. The Council unanimously recommended:

- 5,390 for the B-10 Outfitter Sponsored Big Game Combination license at \$1,250 per license
- Outfitter Sponsored Elk Combination license at \$995 per license (part of above quota)
- 2,250 quota for the B-11 Outfitter Sponsored Deer Combination license at \$995 per license
- HB585 (Coming home to Hunt)

HB585 was passed during the 2009 legislative session allowing for 500 Class B-10 Nonresident Big Game Combination licenses and 500 Class B-11 Nonresident Deer Combination Licenses. Adult nonresidents who have family members residing in Montana and who previously hunted as a resident in Montana or have completed Montana Hunter safety prior to March 1, 2010 may receive a sponsored B10 or B11 license. The nonresident must be sponsored and accompanied by an immediate family member. The quotas for the licenses will not affect the license quotas established in 87-2-505 and 87-2-510.

Action: Vermillion moved and Moody seconded the motion to adopt the 2010 Annual Rule for the Sale of Nonresident Combination Licenses as proposed.

Vermillion stated that some concerns had been expressed by the public about the increase in the outfitter sponsored licenses. This is statutorily directed. He said the Council was very thorough, and reached a unanimous decision.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

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Commissioner Vermillion introduced a bonus point enhancement proposal that the Headwater Sportsmen's Association asked the Commission to consider. He said the Licensing Bureau feels it is doable with the

limitation of fee changes, which is under the purview of the legislature. The proposal is to enhance the current Montana Bonus Point System to incorporate a multiplier in determining bonus chances for participating hunters. The current system allocates one bonus point for each species as applied for by the sportsman. The points accumulate each year as long as the small fee is paid or until the applicant is successful in the drawing. Based on purely statistical theory a person with 8 bonus points currently for any one special draw species has only a slight mathematical advantage over the first time applicant who does not even participate in the bonus system. The “multiplier enhancement” would follow the theory that encourages the sportsman to participate as they see value in their participating and truly create a better opportunity to draw. Bonus points awarded would be as follows:

- 1 bonus point -----1x1=1 bonus chance
- 2 “ “ -----2x2=4 bonus chances
- 3 “ “ -----3x3=9 bonus chances
- 8 “ “ -----8x8=64 bonus chances

The proposed enhancement should be very inexpensive for FWP to implement, as it is most likely a data input correction in our current computer system. The anticipated increase in participation in purchasing points would generate any monies needed in the short run to make the computer changes and future monies would increase the annual receipts to the FWP.

Neal Whitney, FWP License Analyst, said he had performed an audit on sheep in 2009 using this new process, and the results indicated a large increase in chances.

Moody said to put it out for public comment. The present system does not provide the bonus opportunity it did when it was first established.

Colton said this is a large issue and he would be reluctant to make a decision on such short notice. He questioned if there is time to gather data to present to the public.

Worsech said mock drawings could be done to obtain data.

Director Maurier asked what happens to existing points.

Worsech said current points would move forward. This system would create increased opportunity.

*Action: Vermillion moved and Ream seconded the motion to enhance the current Montana Bonus Point System to incorporate a multiplier in determining bonus chances for participating hunters.*

Chairman Colton asked for public comment. There was none.

*Action on Motion: Motion carried.*

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Ken McDonald, FWP Wildlife Division Bureau Chief, spoke to the process behind the proposals. Subsequent to comments received two years ago expressing the opinion that the public did not receive ample opportunity to comment, FWP performed extensive internal and external (public) scopings for ideas and thoughts on regulations. The Commission reviewed the scoping summary in October. He said there is a full cadre of biologists and field staff who meet with the public and work on recommendations on a daily basis, and before final decisions are made on these proposals, written comments will be accepted, forty-five statewide public meetings will be held, and the FWP website offers Survey Monkey for additional public comment opportunities.

11. 2010 License and Permit Allocation Process for Deer, Elk, and Antelope – Proposed. *NOTE: No changes from 2009 season elements are proposed EXCEPT the specific items generally listed below.*

Statewide

Move nonresident application deadline for either sex elk permits and antlered buck mule deer permits to March 15. Drawing allotment would be 10% of previous year's number of permits. Surplus will be determined after that.

Moody asked if the entire drawing process (resident and non-resident) could be moved to earlier in the year.

Kujala replied that the annual surveys have to be completed before the drawings, and surveys occur in the winter, spring, and early summer.

Action: Vermillion moved and Ream seconded the motion to adopt permit allocations as proposed.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Mary Ellen Schnurr, MOGA, supports the motion.

Doll suggested eliminating the third choice in archery permits as it would help non-residents, and stated that party applications of "up to five" is too many, it should be reduced to three.

Colton stated that the party application is a separate item. There has been no scoping on elimination of the third choice so this would not be an appropriate time to act on it.

Action on motion: Motion carried.

Statewide

Implement party application up to five persons for residents and nonresidents for deer and elk special permit and license applications. Residents and nonresidents may not mix if application deadline above is adjusted.

Action: Vermillion moved and Moody seconded the motion to adopt the party application of two to five persons.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Mary Ellen Schnurr, MOGA, said they support the proposal for up to five people, resident or non-resident.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

12. 2010/2011 Deer/Elk/Antelope Hunting Seasons and HD Boundaries – Proposed. Season structures and hunting district boundaries are adopted biennially for all game species. FWP proposes existing structure except for specific changes. Proposals are based on population status and/or other circumstances.

Deer and Elk

Statewide Proposal

Saturday opening day for deer and elk general big game season, which is one day earlier than the traditional Sunday opening day.

Action: Vermillion moved and Doll seconded the motion to approve a statewide Saturday opening day for deer and elk general big game season, which is one day earlier than the traditional Sunday opening day, for 2010-2011. Willie seconded.

Colton said the Commission and FWP is going to hear from the public about students missing out on opening day because of youth activities and sporting events in schools, etc.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Tom Bugni, Skyline Sportsmen, said ten years ago he proposed this 10 years ago he brought this up and there a lot of people who have Saturday off, but would rather hunt than go to football game. Opening day was the day to go up and set up camp, but found hunt three hours on Sunday morning and go back home. Trespass for an additional day was an issue back a few years ago. A lot of people have limited days to hunt so this adds one more day. Would create one more good opportunity.

Leroy Mehring, Skyline Sportsmen, is in favor of the Saturday opener. It expands opportunity.

Tony Schoonen, Skyline Sportsmen, is in favor of Saturday opener, but wants to keep four wheelers out on opening day.

Larry Thomas, Anaconda Sportsmen, is in favor of the Saturday opener.

Director Maurier noted that many of the tentative proposals are due to public comments.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

DEER

Statewide

Create youth deer hunting season on third Thursday and Friday of October. Kids 12-15 accompanied by a non-hunting adult 18 or older may take whatever is valid during general season. (Teachers' conference annually falls during this time period.)

Colton suggested changing the upper age limit to 16 years of age.

Action: Moody moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to approve the youth hunting proposal as recommended.

Action: Moody amended the motion to change the age limits to 12-16. Colton seconded the motion to amend the motion.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Steve Kamps, Montana Bowhunters Association, said this concerns them, and asked if this is statewide.

Kujala replied to the affirmative, and added that it is for deer only.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

DEER

Region 1 - Deer

No proposed changes except for date progressions.

Action: Ream moved and Moody seconded the motion to approve the Region 1 Deer proposals.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment. There was none.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

Region 2 - Deer

HD 250 -- convert unlimited antlered buck mule deer permits to 400 limited permits

HDs 280/281/283/285/292/298 – convert general license ES WT archery and firearm season to AB WT; reduce antlerless licenses 281-00 and 283-00 from 100 each to 50 each

HD 282 – decrease 282-00 antlerless deer licenses from 50 to 25

HD 292/298 – combine unlimited antlered buck permits for each district into one permit batch (292-40) valid in both districts

Action: Ream moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to approve the Region 2 Deer proposals.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment. There was none.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

Region 3 - Deer

HD 302 – convert from AB MD general license to unlimited AB MD unlimited permits 302-40; decrease antlerless MD licenses 302-00 from 75 to 25

HD 309 – increase OTC antlerless WT licenses from 1 to 5 per person

HD 320/331/333 – clarify antlerless MD licenses with LPT suffix XXX-00

HD 329 -- convert from AB MD general license to unlimited AB MD unlimited permits in 329-40; decrease antlerless MD licenses in 329-00 from 50 to 25

HD 388 – clarify language of Exclusion Zone in Weapons Restriction Area “Outside Weapons Restriction Area”; clarify in Deer/Elk and Antelope HD 388

Action: Vermillion moved and Moody seconded the motion to approve recommendations in HDs 302, 309, 320, 331, 333, and 388.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment:

Leroy Mehring, Skyline Sportsmen, said there are not 50 antlerless mule deer in the whole HD300 area and there are 50 permits. There should not be any antlerless mule deer hunting in any of the 300 districts, and no either sex either.

Vermillion stated that he consistently hears the concern that the HD300 district does not have a population of mule deer.

Action on Motion: Motion carried

Action: Vermillion moved and Colton seconded the motion to reduce the quota in HD302-40 and HD329 from 75 to 0.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Leroy Mehring recommended adding HD330 into this motion as well - to 0 quota.

Kujala said that reducing to a zero quota is a structure change for the next two years. When the regulation booklet is produced, the numbers are brought forward from the previous year, and if there is a number in the book, applicants put in for the number in the book.

Action: Vermillion amended his motion to include two alternatives, the tentative as written, or the alternative of eliminating antlerless tags in those districts. Colton seconded the amendment to the motion. Motion carried.

Region 4 - Deer

REGION-WIDE -- convert any general license ES MD archery and firearm season to AB MD

LPT 004-10/498-00 – combine unlimited resident and nonresident single region antlerless WT license

HDs 400/401/406 – create 300 antlerless WT licenses 400-01 valid in all three HDs

HDs 404/444 – create 300 antlerless WT licenses 404-01 valid in both HDs

HD 406 – maintain access permit to Marias State Park/Wildlife Management Area; require ALS# for application; summer application period

HDs 416/446/449/452/454 – create 500 antlerless WT licenses 416-01 valid in all 5 HDs

HD 422 – create 50 antlerless MD licenses 422-00 valid outside Nat'l Forest Bndy

HD 424 – create 25 antlerless MD licenses 424-00 valid outside Nat'l Forest Bndy

HD 425 – create 25 antlerless MD licenses 425-00 valid outside Sun River WMA

HD 442 – create 25 antlerless MD licenses 442-00 valid outside Nat'l Forest Bndy and Ear Mtn WMA

Action: Moody moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to approve the Region 4 Deer proposals as presented.

Moody asked if since this is along the Rocky Mountain Front if it will require a hunter to pay extra money.

Kujala replied yes, as it is a general license, so would require an additional license.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment. There was none.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

Region 5 - Deer

HDs 511/520/540 -- convert general license ES MD archery and firearm season to AB MD

HD 560 – convert general license ES MD firearm season to AB MD

Action: Colton moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to approve the Region 5 Deer proposals.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment. There was none.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

Region 6 - Deer

Region-Wide -- combine unlimited resident and nonresident single region antlerless WT license 006-10

HD 630 – convert 630-20 ES WT license to ES WT permit

Pat Gunderson, FWP Region 6 Supervisor, said this is a handicapped hunt and was inadvertently established as a license area. This is a justification that the Missouri River Valley has an over-abundance from Fort Peck to the North Dakota border. All whitetail licenses will be honored.

Doll stated that there is not an over-abundance in portions along Milk River and Missouri River valleys.

Action: Doll moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to approve the Region 6 Deer proposals.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Tony Schoonen, Skyline Sportsmen, said up to 7 mule deer doe permits are given out over the counter and he is concerned. The mule deer population is way down – do not give out that many permits over the counter.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

Region 7 - Deer

No proposed changes.

Action: Colton moved and Moody seconded the motion to approve the Region 7 Deer proposals.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Paul Ellis, MOGA, said there is a decline of populations in Region 7, and suggested to reduce or eliminate doe licenses in Region 7. Certain areas have no mule deer left, particularly in the Cherry Creek and Sheep Mountain areas.

John Wilkinson, Miles City, said the mule deer south of Miles City (Alzada, Ekalaka area), where three blizzards have occurred, have decreased by 35 percent, and the antelope have decreased by 75 percent. He said to stop deer hunting in those areas. The doe hunters will come back to his area where there are still some deer.

John Ensign, FWP Region 7 Wildlife Manager, said surveys are flown in the spring, and the blizzards occurred after spring counts were done. Going to region-wide tags allows discretionary hunting. Landowners don't have to allow hunting if there are no deer. Spring counts will provide information for adjusting quotas.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

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Doll asked if the 5-week season could be changed so that the first three weeks are either sex, and the last two weeks are antlerless only. He suggested trying it in Regions 6 and 7 to see what happens. It is an attempt to remove the rifle season from the rut season. He would like to hear what the public has to say about it.

Colton said this issue came up years ago, and is hotly contested by several groups. He is apprehensive about putting a tentative this large out now without any public notice.

Kujala said that the discussion to remove the pressure from the bucks in the rut is not new. Historically, public comment reflects opinions on both ends of the spectrum. The deer plan speaks to five weeks, but does not talk about splitting the season. Doll's proposal could cause the hunters to be squeezed into a shorter time frame. FWP is using the adaptive deer plan, which looks at district-specific management of deer. This has been tried before in different areas with little satisfaction.

Vermillion stated that he is sensitive to the subject, and agreed that the mule deer plan needs to be reviewed, however a proposal of this magnitude would be best entertained at a later date as it is a big deal to a lot of people.

No action taken by the Commission on this issue.

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Mike Gilles, Basin, proposed a muzzleloaders season be allowed after the general season while the elk are migrating. Bowhunters have their own season so he feels the muzzleloaders should too.

No action taken by the Commission on this issue.

**Statewide**

Saturday opener one day earlier than traditional Sunday for firearm season

Assemble existing License Permit Types (LPTs) 401-15, 411-15, 420-15, 500-15, 502-15, 580-15, 590-15 and 799-15 for all or portions of the 23 HDs 401, 403, 441, 450, 411, 412, 426, 511, 530, 420, 447, 455, 500, 570, 502, 510, 520, 575, 580, 590, 702, 704, 705 (as described in 2009 regulations) **into one bundle/LPT 900-15**. This permit group would be valid only during the archery season throughout the entire area described in total by the 23 districts or portions of districts (see 2009 regulations). These permit holders could also archery hunt in other general license districts. Total number of permits would be equal to the sum of the first and second choice resident and nonresident eligible applicants from the 2009 drawing process. This sum is 2950 (rounded from 2947) and would accommodate 95% of the 2009 eligible resident applications and 45% of the 2009 eligible nonresident applications. This number of permits would apply to both the 2010 and 2011 seasons. Applicants may apply first, second or third choice. Antlerless elk would remain available on the general license during the archery season.

*Action: Ream moved and Vermillion seconded the motion to adopt the Statewide Elk recommendations as presented.*

Moody said there is the perception that people who draw the elk archery permits do not show up to hunt, and others would like the opportunity.

Vermillion stated that these tentative proposals will be presented statewide at regional meetings. The public needs to realize that the Commission does listen to their comments. Southeastern Montana has more public lands and block management areas to hunt on, creating a significant hunting opportunity. He questioned why it is so hard to reach objectives.

Kujala stated that the Department takes objectives seriously, and noted that the elk plan identifies three packages, which are restrictive, standard, and liberal.

Vermillion stated that a consistent issue is access, and one solution might be the HB454 agreements.

Kujala agreed, but stated that only one ranch has met the HB454 criteria and indicated interest.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Jason Townsley, Montana Bowhunters Association, said they are consistently opposed to permits. The previous unlimited structure did not reach objective. They prefer the structure of 2007.

Leroy Mehring, Skyline Sportsmen, is in favor of the bundling, and recommended eliminating the third choice application as that would give other hunters an opportunity.

Tony Schoonen, Skyline Sportsmen, said this proposal provides equal opportunity. The way it was done before gave the bowhunters the advantage. He supports this proposal.

Steve Kamps, Montana Bowhunters Association, said it is important that the Breaks districts are separated from the other districts.

Mary Ellen Schnurr, MOGA, said there is no biological basis to limit hunters as this proposal suggests. She feels FWP is limiting hunting just because they feel like it. They do not support reducing the number of permits available.

Jason Townsley, Montana Bowhunters Association, said this is the closest thing they agreed on as a group. Several preferred the 2007 structure.

*Action on Motion: Motion carried.*

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Replace all antlerless and brow-tined bull/antlerless elk permits with antlerless elk licenses. Unless specifically noted otherwise, this replacement would exchange one permit for one license everywhere antlerless (or BTB/antlerless) permits are in place or proposed to be in place. Holding this license would not limit the hunter to just an antlerless elk in the district for which the license is valid. All other components (time, place) would remain unchanged in this conversion. These antlerless licenses are “stand alone” licenses with no prerequisite purchase except the conservation license. They are commonly referred to as “A9/B12” licenses in reference to their statutory identification (resident and nonresident versions of the same license). This proposal would not preclude individual districts from offering permits *in addition* to these antlerless licenses to secure individual hunter harvest of two *antlerless* elk.

Action: Vermillion moved and Ream seconded the motion to replace all antlerless and browtined bull/antlerless elk permits with antlerless elk licenses as proposed.

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Rod Bullis, Helena, said it takes legislative action to replace the regulations with antlerless permits. There is a great deal of pressure put on the bulls.

Action on Motion: Motion carried.

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Implement 4-year waiting period for those limited entry either sex, antlered bull or brow-tined bull elk permits (hereafter “either sex”) with drawing odds 10% or less based upon first choice resident and nonresident applicants of the previous year’s drawing as presented in the elk regulation booklet. If an applicant receives an either sex elk permit that had a drawing success rate of 10% or less the previous year, that applicant must wait four years before applying for any either sex elk permit with a 10% or less drawing success rate. The list of districts may change annually based upon the previous year’s drawing results. To clarify, an applicant receiving one of these either sex elk permits in 2009 would not be eligible to apply for any other either sex elk permit with a drawing success rate of 10% or less until 2013. Either sex elk permits that fall into this category based upon the 2009 drawing are:

Landowners qualifying for landowner preference would not be exempted from this waiting period for these either sex permits. However, for each or any year of the waiting period a qualifying landowner may secure an either sex elk permit valid only on his/her deeded land via a hunting access contract as defined by “HB 454 access agreements”. This option—already available for implementation--requires FWP Commission approval to allocate a permit to a landowner in exchange for agreed-to public elk hunting access. Except for the implementation of a waiting period, this proposal would not adjust existing landowner preference.

Moody likes the concept of the 4-year waiting period, but would like to exempt the landowners from that waiting period.

*Action: Moody moved and Doll seconded the motion to approve a 4-year waiting period in the HDs listed above, however the landowners would be exempted from that 4-year period.*

Chairman Colton asked for public comment.

Marvin Mace, Helena said he provided language ten years ago toward accomplishing this. Landowners applying for landowner preference should only be allowed to hunt on their own property.

*Action on Motion: Motion carried.*

Actually, everyone puts in. Leave any bull on the proposal.

Leroy Mehring said the split season is popular. It would be detrimental to change the season. He is opposed to making the area open to browtined bulls.

Tom Bugni, Skyline Sportsmen, said to do away with the two-elk regulation and retain the spike elk regulation in the Lima Peaks and Medicine Lodge up Sheep Creek.

Rod Bullis, Helena, is concerned about the antlerless increase in HD339 and HD343 that went to 500 and 800. Going to the last two weeks antlerless only will create a large crowding issue. Offer end of season antlerless licenses.

*Action on Motion: Motion carried.*

Both the antelope either sex application and the antelope doe/fawn application would each include 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> choices. This would allow any single applicant to potentially receive two antelope licenses from the drawing—one either sex and one doe/fawn. These could be in the same or in different hunting districts. This is consistent with current regulations that allow an individual hunter to hold up to three antelope licenses only one of which may be either sex.

Adjust the antelope 900 archery only license structure and application process to include a separate application process from the existing antelope application and drawing process. Specifically, adjust the antelope 900 archery only license to first and only choice with an application deadline of May 1 (same as Moose, Sheep, Goat and Bison). Application for this license would then preclude the applicant from applying for other antelope licenses to be allocated in the existing Deer, Elk and Antelope drawing with an application deadline of June 1. If successful in securing an antelope 900 license, the applicant may still purchase up to two antelope doe/fawn 900-30 licenses and could still purchase any surplus antelope licenses within the existing limitation of only three antelope licenses per hunter only one of which may be either sex.

Kurt Alt, FWP Region 3 Wildlife Manager, said the Department has closed other districts at similar population levels, and that has never been challenged before. In this case, the population has struggled, and is continuing to decrease. Surveys have indicated extremely low numbers. It is an area of concern.

They believe there is a high potential for over-harvest of lions in the Bearpaw Mountains. Last year 6 were killed on private land in this area – it is dominated by one outfitter. Tribal land is not open to hunting to the general public. Lion research has been conducted over the last 3 years, indicating there is a very small population of females. Harvesting them would be detrimental to the Bearpaw population. Splitting the HD would split the quota between the two districts of which HD690 is mountains and foothills, and HD680 is prairie and breaks areas. There are large differences in access.

Mike Murphy, Wolf Creek, said there is a need to maintain the balance. In HD381, the lions are hammering the big game populations. He would like to see HD339 separated and a quota established there.

Steve Kamps, Montana Bowhunters Association, supports the proposals.

Mary Ellen Schnurr, MOGA, said several outfitters have mentioned the predation issue of big game. It is past time to put limits on. Predators are killing everything off. Look at the prey base as well as the species of consideration.

Rod Bullis, Helena, said he has advocated a Mountain Lion plan. He suggested a report on what general lion hunting season has done since ten years ago when it was reestablished. Orphaning kittens is a nationwide issue.

Roland Deane, Montana Houndsmen Association, is not in favor of this season. It will not make a significant difference on the amount of lions taken.

Moody said there has to be a better way to find out how many lions there are than they way it is done now.

Harold Wentland, Region 6 Wildlife Manager, stated that tukeys are a marginal commodity, that the weather and predators get them. The region does not support micro closures, so would not support a closure in the Little Rockies specifically for them.

**\*\*Jeff Herbert, FWP Wildlife Assistant Bureau Chief, said there is no biological reason to hunt hen pheasants. In the early 1970s there was one hen in the bag allowed. It is a social issue.**

**\*\*Doll made amendments to the Upland Game Bird section at the January Commission meeting as follows:**  
Doll recommended that the Little Rockies be closed to turkey hunting. He stated, too, that the pheasant is the only bird species in Montana where it is unlawful to take a hen. These quotas represent proposed authority and limits to potentially prescribed harvest from any future game damage hunts and/or management seasons. To clarify, these quotas represent prescribed harvest—not necessarily permit/license numbers or hunter numbers.
