As a retired private guide who had a license for twenty years in Yellowstone Park, I have been privileged to observe the growing repopulation of wolves in our beloved state. Because of my intimate knowledge of these prime carnivores, I am writing to you with a plea to not extend either the quotas nor the length of seasons for hunting and trapping Montana wolves.

We have a precarious population of a still recovering species, and we need to give them more time to re-establish their rightful place in our various ecosystems.

Wolves are an excellent check on the spread of chronic wasting disease.

Hunting disrupts pack social structure and thus contributes to human/wolf encounters with pack members radically changing behaviors as a result of fractured pack support.

Trapping is proved to impact other, non-intended species as often as the intended species, and is an increasing danger to the greater numbers of domestic pets and children who are frequenting our public lands.

To promote the health of our public lands I am pleading with you to oppose any measures that will increase the likelihood of more wolf deaths that your current quotas allow. Please also consider establishing tighter restrictions on trapping on our public lands to protect humans, domestic and wildlife from cruel and unnecessary harm and death.

Dear FWP Commissioners,

We are writing to request that you reduce the number of wolves allowed to be killed in Units 313 and 316 two one or zero, to NOT accept the proposal to extend the wolf hunting and trapping seasons in Region 1, and to NOT increase the bag limit to 10 wolves.

We would appreciate it if you would accept our thoughts below:

- Wolves are important for healthy Montana ecosystems and should not be managed based on politics, but with care and according to the best available science. This is particularly crucial in this time of climate change and instability for wildlife.
- Wolves are really important in containing Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD). Dr. Valerius Geist, has stated that "Wolves will certainly bring the disease to a halt ... They will remove infected individuals and clean up carcasses that could transmit the disease." He along with other biologists even theorized that killing off wolves "allowed for CWD to take hold in the first place."
- We are very concerned that FWP does not listen to the general public, who increasingly opposes killing wild animals for 'recreation.' Instead, FWP seems to put wishes of a smaller group of hunters and trappers. This isn't right. The general public and the large eco-tourism industry wants to see living wolves. This is what our family depends on. Wolves should not be managed for those who enjoy killing them but rather for the majority of the public who wants to see them alive
- Very importantly, indiscriminate slaughter of wolves disrupts their social systems and may contribute to greater human conflicts with the killing of alpha family members and leads to a reduced effectiveness of the wolf family for hunting or cause them to lose their territory.
- Killing wolves for recreation and trophies is lousy! It promotes cruelty and a view of wildlife and objects and not other living, feeling creatures warranting respect and care.
- Trapping of any animal, whether wolves or members of other species is barbaric, cruel and there is no justification this type of torture of wild animals.

Dear Commissioners,

Firstly, thank you for all the work that you do to ensure best management practices for all of our wildlife in Montana.

Regrettably, I will not be able to attend the Feb 13th meeting in Helena or within my region. I would have attended the Feb 6th meeting, that was originally announced, but when the new date was announced, I already had a client booked for that day and I must meet that committment. I checked with all of the other guides that I know in Gardiner, Livingston and Bozeman and they are all booked. In future, would it be possible to announce and maintain a date for the meeting much further in advance (6 months minimum), so that we can ensure that we keep that date open and can attend? Also, we had no meeting in Gardiner this year, despite initial indications that we would. I have submitted written comments to the MTFWP website prior to the Jan 27th deadline, but I am gravely concerned that my input and interests are not going to be considered because I cannot be at the commissioners meeting in person. Is there anything else we can do? My concerns are summarized below:

I am a biologist, small Montana business owner and guide in Yellowstone. While hunting doesn't occur within the boundaries of the national park, it does impact the wildlife populations that my livelihood depends on. I run about 130 wildlife watching trips per year in Yellowstone. Everyone wants to see our large predators: wolves, grizzlies and cougars. Of course, wolves and cougars follow their prey to lower elevations in the winter and are subject to hunting pressures. It looks terrible for all of us residents in the state of Montana when we have to explain how a badly limping wolf inside the park was injured by a hunter just outside the park and is suffering and struggling because the shot was not taken well. It's shameful having to talk about the illegal hunting of mountain lion in the park and the legally questionable demise of the black female wolf just outside the northeast boundary of Yellowstone (ditto with the bison hunted there and left to spoil). Hunting predators adjacent to Yellowstone impacts my sighting success and my business success as well as visitor perceptions of our state. As such, I strongly support the lowest possible quotas for units adjacent to Yellowstone for both wolves and cougars and I support shortened hunting seasons, not longer seasons as now proposed.

To the FWP Commission members:

In Montana, wildlife killers, rural legislators and ranchers, and the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation (RMEF) dictate the prosecution of Wolves.

Consequently, archaic management is done by numbers, with prejudice, instead of the best available science and with compassion.

In 2017 alone, at least 254 wolves were killed for recreation and trophies. Hunters killed 166 wolves and trappers killed 88 wolves. An additional 100 wolves are allowed to be killed on private lands. Yet, the wolf killers are not satisfied and want even more wolves to die.

Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP) is now proposing to even Extend! the merciless sadistic hunting and trapping seasons for Wolves!

You are proposing the following changes in Northwest Montana (Region 1), where nearly 50% of the total number of Wolves are killed every year! We are AGAINST

- 1. Extending the general and archery hunting season by one month, to begin two weeks earlier, on August 15 (instead of September 1) and two weeks longer through March 31 (instead of March 15).
- 2. Extending the trapping season by two weeks through March 15 the wolf trapping season currently starts at December 15 and ends on Feb. 28.
- 3. Increasing the 'bag limit' for an individual hunter/trapper from 5 to 10 (!) wolves. The proposal also does not drop the wolf quota in two units (313, 316) just north of Yellowstone National Park as a previous proposal suggested and instead, maintains to kill two wolves in each unit!!!!

Do Not allow the killing of even more Wolves, this must END NOW! Every individual wolf matters for her/himself, for their mates, families, ecosystem health and for us, who value them alive! I condemn these disastrous plans!

FWP Commissioners, I am asking you to reduce the number of wolves allowed to be killed in Units 313 and 316 from two to one, to NOT accept the proposal to extend the wolf hunting and trapping seasons in Region 1, and to NOT increase the bag limit to 10 wolves.

Instead, please consider the following:

Montana needs to recognize and value the importance of wolves for healthy ecosystems, in particular under the threat of climate change where healthy ecosystems are our best defense. Wolves should not be managed based on politics, but according to the best available science and with compassion.

Wolves may contain Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD). Dr. Valerius Geist has stated that "Wolves will certainly bring the disease to a halt ... They will remove infected individuals and clean up carcasses that could transmit the disease." Dear FWP Commissioners,

I am a third generation Montanan who is asking you to NOT extend the wolf hunting and trapping seasons, NOT to increase the bag limit from 5 to 10 wolves in Region 2, and to maintain the number of wolves allowed to be "harvested," i.e. "killed," in unit 313 and 316, just north of Yellowstone National Park, at one per unit.

I live in the Swan Valley and co-exist with top predators on the top of the food chain including grizzly and black bears, mountain lions, lynx, wolverines, and wolves. I take the measures to discourage predators from becoming habituated to human garbage and livestock feed that is left unsecured. I bring my dogs inside at nighttime. It's not hard to do. More whitetail deer are hit and killed on Hwy 83 than taken during hunting season so why aren't we addressing that issue? Speeding and careless motorists

present a greater risk to ungulate species than predators. We all know that the sale of hunting and trapping licenses are in decline. Why? The majority of Americans are appalled at the unethical hunters and trappers who shoot elk for the trophy head and leave the rest of it to rot or trappers who carelessly place traps in areas where people with pets recreate. Outdoor recreationists want to take their dogs (pets) on winter outings but are prevented from doing so in fear that their pet (dog) will get caught in a trap that is too close to roads, trailheads, and trails. I am strongly opposed to increasing wolf hunting and trapping on public lands that belong to ALL Americans and we greatly outnumber hunters and trappers. The proposed FWP changes to increase wolf hunting and trapping equates to an outright slaughter of wolves and defies "fair chase."

I hope you are paying attention to the slaughter of wolves by outfitters outside of Denali National Park. To Whom It May Concern:

I am protesting the expanded extending wolf hunting and trapping, including deep within Wilderness areas and remote public lands.

Wolves used to exist on the entire North American continent and due to human expansion & destructive hunting their range has been reduced to a mere fraction of their original range. The species cannot maintain their already decimated numbers with such aggressive hunting tactics. This proposal acts as an attack on an already beleaguered species that holds a vital role in the natural ecosystem. Destroying the wolf would actually damage the environment and other species that hunters rely upon.

Here are some reasons as to why we need wolves:

"Reason #1: Without wolves and other large predators, ecosystems can go haywire. A 2001 study (PDF [motherjones.com]) found that when wolves went extinct in Yellowstone, for example, the moose

population ballooned to five times its normal size and demolished woody vegetation where birds nested. As a result, several bird species were eliminated in the park.

**Reason #2:** Scavengers thrive when wolves are around. The species that help themselves to wolves' leftovers include (<u>PDF [motherjones.com]</u>) ravens, magpies, wolverines, bald eagles, golden eagles, three weasel species, mink, lynx, cougar, grizzly bear, chickadees, masked shrew, great gray owl, and more than 445 species of beetle.

**Reason #3:** Wolf kills are also good for the soil. A 2009 <u>study [ncbi.nlm.nih.gov]</u> in Michigan's Isle Royale National Park found that wolf-killed elk carcasses dramatically enhanced levels of nitrogen and other nutrients.

**Reason #4:** Wolf kills feed more animals than hunting by humans, since wolves scatter their carrion over the landscape. Wolf kills benefit (<u>PDF [motherjones.com]</u>) three times more species than human hunting kills. The carcass above was a bull elk killed by a pack of eight wolves in Agate Creek, Yellowstone. The skeleton was picked clean by wolves and scavengers in less than five days.

**Reason #5:** When wolves disappeared from Yellowstone, coyotes preyed on pronghorn almost to the point of no return. But since wolves have returned, the pronghorn have <u>come back [sciencedaily.com]</u>. In fact, pronghorns tend to give birth near wolf dens, since coyotes steer clear of those areas.

**Reason #6:** Deer and elk congregate in smaller groups (<u>PDF [motherjones.com]</u>) when wolves are around. This helps reduce the transmission of illnesses like Chronic Wasting Disease.

**Reason #7:** <u>Chronic Wasting Disease [en.wikipedia.org]</u> is a major threat to elk and deer in the West. Wolves can <u>help [motherjones.com]</u> by reducing sick animals' lifespans, in turn limiting the amount of time they can spread infections.

Hello,

I would like to speak out against the plan to let all hunters and trappers in Montana kill 10 wolves per year.

**ELK**, no longer pressured by predatory wolves, will became abundant and began to damage their own habitat, and the habitat of property owners. Having lost the fear of being hunted, elk will gather near streams, overbrowsing aspens, willows, cottonwoods, and shrubs that grow on banks and prevent erosion. Habitat for fish, amphibians, and reptiles will decline as waters became broader, shallower, and warmer without shade from streamside vegetation. Elk populations were so out of control that park

rangers began to kill and relocate elk in large numbers in an attempt to reduce their burgeoning population in Yellowstone Park until 1995.

**ASPENS** seldom reached full height in Yellowstone's northern valleys, when wolves were not in the park. Browsed by elk, the new sprouts and shoots were eaten, and existing trees were stunted. Along streams and around wetlands willows and cottonwoods will also not regenerate as effectively under heavy browsing pressure from elk. Fewer young trees meant songbirds lost nesting space. Beaver populations decreased as they rely on this vegetation to survive.

**COYOTES**, no longer having to share the land with wolves, will become much more abundant. There are already many stories of coyotes eating family pets in Montana. Though coyotes will kill elk calves, they prey mainly on pocket gophers, voles, and other small mammals. They also specialize in killing the fawns of pronghorn. The lack of carcasses left behind by wolves reduces the food traditionally available for coyotes, foxes, badgers, raptors, and other scavengers.

**WOLVES** play a vital role in keeping the world of predator and prey in balance. Once they've eaten their fill, the leftovers from their kills provide food for scavengers, including endangered species such as bald and golden eagles, magpies, coyotes, ravens, and bears. Wolves boost ecotourism and far more can be made via ecotourism longterm than hunting licenses.

Please do not let a few hunters and trappers who enjoy hunting wolves in cruel and vengeful methods dominate this discourse. Wolves are an incredible part of the ecosystem and their role in Montana's beauty should be taken into account.



Dear FWP Commission, I'm writing to recommend that you not extend the wolf hunting and trapping seasons and that you maintain the quota for hunters to kill wolves in Region 1 at five wolves or fewer, and the number of wolves allowed to be killed in Units 313 and 316 north of Yellowstone remain at one wolf per unit.

I live in the Swan Valley. I walk, hike or ski most days of the year. I spend a lot of time outdoors and I have not seen a wolf in Montana yet. This is a big disappointment because I love seeing wildlife. I've been here 38 years. I see bears, lions and coyotes frequently. I've even seen a wolverine in the Mission Mountains. I haven't heard wolves howl in the Swan Valley recently or seen wolf tracks in the snow this winter. I know other people have been more fortunate and have seen wolves. But I believe too many wolves are being killed, and that is part of the reason I haven't seen any.

I'm concerned about CWD. If we want to control the spread of this disease we should be maintaining predator populations, not reducing them. Hunters (I'm one) have plenty of opportunities to shoot deer and elk in this state, without increasing the wolf harvest.

I believe we need all the predator and prey species that were here 100 years ago to be present now, and that the predators and prey should be allowed to balance their populations without human manipulation.
