Please also continue to prohibit the use of bait and hunting at night.

I am a property owner in Park County and I am writing to express my significant concerns about the new legislative changes to how the state manages its wolf populations.

Taken together, these bills have the potential to financially endanger and undermine the objectives of Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks, as well as negatively impact the economy of my home county.

First, it is possible that this legislation poses a threat to a vital funding source for Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks. It is my understanding that the jobs of the agency's wildlife biologists are supported by

a combination of hunting license revenue and a federal match via the Pittman-Robertson Act. A state may be ineligible for federal funding under the Act if it passes contrary legislation.

Second, it does not appear that killing more wolves would help the agency meet its aims of balancing ungulate populations. The 2018, 2019, and 2020 elk count data show that the vast majority of units in Regions 3 and 5, which surround Park County, are either meeting or exceeding their objectives. Population data for white-tailed deer in the same regions also are above the long-term averages. Wolves are capable of efficiently hunting large prey, such as elk, that other predators cannot usually kill. Wolf kills thereby provide cascading benefits for other wildlife communities by providing valuable sources of food and preventing overgrazing by ungulates. The bills have been projected to drastically decrease wolf populations, thereby having rippling negative effects on ecosystems and on FWP's objectives.

Third, the economic generators in my county are heavily tourism dependent. The communities of Cooke City, Gardiner, and Livingston are supported primarily by visitors to Yellowstone National Park, whose Lamar Valley is acclaimed and beloved as the "Serengeti" of the U.S. for its opportunity to glimpse the cycle of life as dramatized by the area's charismatic megafauna. To say nothing of their important ecological role, wolves are starring members of the show that visitors travel long distances to watch. Reducing wolf populations is likely to negatively impact tourism, which, for better or worse, is currently the economic lifeblood of Park County.

These bills are also ineffective and unethical when considered individually.

Snares, for example, are not known for being finely tuned enough to differentiate between a wolf, a beloved family dog, a Canada Lynx, or even a moose. This issue has manifested in other locations where snares are allowed. According to the agency's website [adfg.alaska.gov], Alaska Department of Fish and Game biologists estimate that wolf snares catch up to 1% of moose annually in areas with heavy trapping pressure. They report that most moose caught in wolf snares die either at the capture site or subsequent to release. In addition to being undiscriminating, snares are cruel. Without mandated check times--which I expect would be extremely onerous and cost-prohibitive for FWP staff to enforce--an animal caught within a snare can languish, dying slowly from their injuries, from exposure, exhaustion, dehydration, asphyxiation, starvation, or predation. This is on top of the fear and anxiety any animal would endure while snared.

Ultimately, wildlife management decisions should be in the capable hands of the Commission and scientists with Montana FWP, not with politicians. I respectfully request that the Commissioners direct Montana FWP to show restraint and thoughtfulness in their interpretation and implementation of these bills. Efforts exist throughout the West, such as the Wood River Wolf Project in our neighbor Idaho, to prevent wolf livestock predation through non-lethal means. Unfortunately, Montana's recent legislative changes show a laser focus on a preferred method, which is death, rather than a preferred outcome. I hope that the Commission and Montana FWP scientists will be able to honor the spirit of these bills by addressing the underlying concerns via methods that show more creativity and more respect for the lives of our wild community members.

As someone who has purchased fishing licenses in Montana for over two decades and loves visiting the state and enjoying the great outdoor opportunities available in Montana, I'm deeply disturbed and have serious concerns about the recent direction and overall policies toward wolves and other large carnivores.

I'd first like to provide public comment to be submitted regarding trapping proposals from Rep Fielder. Trapping on public lands is a serious danger to human health and well-being, the safety of our beloved dogs, and trapping takes numerous non-target species, some of which may be federally protected.

Specific to wolves, the current direction of the Montana legislature takes us back to failed predator policies from a century ago that have no basis in science. Wolves self-regulate their population based on available food supply and hunting wolves will break apart their packs, leading to more (not fewer) conflicts. Thank you for the opportunity to comment on proposed changes to the 2021 Wolf Hunting Regulations. EcoTour Adventures is a Wildlife Tour Operator and permittee of Yellowstone National Park. We operate wildlife watching tours 365 days a year including multi day tours of the Northern Range of Yellowstone National Park based in the community of Gardiner, MT. Each year our team of 20 shares our public lands and wildlife with over 10,000 people visiting the area.

Hunting is an integral aspect of Western Culture, many of the guides at EcoTour Adventures are avid elk and deer hunters. The same is true of wildlife watching, visitors to Yellowstone National Park generate \$560 million annually in economic output to local gateway communities, supporting over 6000 jobs.1 Wolf watching alone in Yellowstone generates an estimated \$35 million dollars of economic activity annually for surrounding communities, attracting 150,000 visitors each year2. Last year, Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks reduced wolf hunting quotas in units 313 and 316. Published research shows that wolf hunting adjacent to protected areas leads to decreased viewing opportunities for the public3 and we appreciate this reasonable management compromise that better represents the diverse stakeholders of Montana's public lands and wildlife.

We think this is something that you should be aware of before you decide to allow the insidious, unsporting, inhumane methods of killing Montana's precious wildlife (as well as much loved pets) that have been "suggested" by some Montana Legislators who apparently have never read any wildlife studies. We say "suggested" because what they want you to allow is likely illegal according to previously passed laws against inhumane treatment of animals and especially for fair chase ethical hunting.

By mid June of this year, we noticed there were no fawns with any of the white-tailed deer does that live on our land here on the east side of the Bitterroot River in the middle of Ravalli County. By the first of July, two does finally each had single fawns following them. We had over 15 adult does living on our land most of the time for many years and most usually have fawns, often twins or triples. Having only two does with one fawn is highly unusual. Consequently, I asked friends in Ravalli County from Darby to Florence and also in Missoula what they were observing. They all said that the fawns at their places were 2 to 3 weeks late and they had seen no twins or triplets, only singles. That was really concerning, so I asked my friend in Kalispell what she was observing and she said few fawns and no twins so far this year and those she has seen were from 2 to 3 weeks later than usual. I received the same report from my friend who lives near Helena only they saw the same issues with both deer species and pronghorn antelope. Pronghorn antelope almost always have twins according to the biology books. I have not checked with anyone east of Helena.

Also, we haven't heard anything about elk or other big game animal youngsters yet. Interestingly, last week another doe at our place had about 1½ week old twin fawns with her, obviously born after the first of July, so a full month late. I know that 5 of the adult does that lived on our land during the winter either died or were accident killed this spring, so only 4 fawns is not even replacement. One of those does died because she had a large hairless decomposing female fetus dead inside of her, which is what caused the doe to die. There are at least 6 does still here that appear to be healthy, but have no fawns. They either never were pregnant or they also lost their fetuses last winter, but aborted the remains.

I checked peer reviewed studies and biological information on what might cause late young or no young to be born and the most likely hypothesis is that something happened in September and October that

caused widespread disruption of progesterone production in the female animals. That would have resulted in them all having low progesterone at the same time during the breeding period from the end of October through November. Possibly by the end of December a few of the affected females had regained their normal progesterone levels and were then bred a month late, resulting in the few late fawns being observed. What specific endocrine disrupter that was used at unusually high levels last fall that would have caused the widespread low progesterone levels is unknown and the Agricultural Department was no help. The result of very few fawns being born over such a wide area could cause a decline in the in white-tailed deer, mule deer and pronghorn antelope populations. A similar health issue happened to the elk in the Yellowstone ecosystem in fall of 1994 and in the following 10 years. According to elk researchers, low progesterone in the cow elk resulted in the cow calf ratio declining from 33 calves per 100 cows in the years prior to spring of 1995 to 13 calves per 100 cows in spring of 1995 and after. This lack of viable young resulted in a massive decline in the Yellowstone ecosystem elk herds, beginning with a reported decline in the general population of 5000 to 7000 between fall of 1994 and fall of 1995. Of course, the wolves were blamed for the elk population decline, even though the wolves weren't released from their pens in Yellowstone until after those first massive declines happened and the cow calf ratio had gone down. It is still baffling as to how anyone thought that 14 wolves in a pen could kill thousands of elk. Many long-term elk studies say the wolves were never to blame for the elk and other big game population declines, especially the declines in populations in areas where no wolves yet lived.

It would definitely be helpful for people like you who are in charge of protecting our precious wildlife to read and pay attention to the studies that have been done regarding the wolves and their affect on wild ruminant populations. Also, you should at least look at some of the thousands of studies that show what effects herbicides, insecticides and fungicides have on wildlife, especially wild grazing animals. My website is (www.judyhoy.com [judyhoy.com]). If you click on and read the Scientific American article about what an insecticide does to white-tailed deer females and fawns, you would at least get an idea of what has been happening to the wild grazing animals since spring of 1995. The imidacloprid that was tested on the white-tailed deer began being used in summer of 1994. In spring of 1995 and each year thereafter, the same type of birth defects as found on deer fawns in the imidacloprid study and the deaths in adults shown by the study began being observed in wild and domestic grazing animals. That used to be called a "smoking gun" in past massive die offs caused by pesticides. As a result of massive wildlife die offs Endrin, 2,4,5-T and DDT were banned.

On my website, scroll down to PDFs to Download and click on that. There are a lot of PDFs showing photos of the various birth defects as well as photos of what normal looks like in case people have

forgotten. Also there are the studies we did here in western Montana and the South Dakota white-tailed deer and imidacloprid study the Scientific American article reported. The SD study was based on our first two studies and received worldwide attention because Nature is one of the most prestigious scientific journals. Newborn humans are similarly affected. In 1995, human newborns began being born with high rates of underbite, overbite and male reproductive malformations as well as very serious birth defects that often caused death, like spinabifida, congenital abdominal herniation, Trisomy 13 and 18 and far more Trisomy 21 than usual, as well as missing limbs and many with heart defects. Human newborns get care by doctors, wild newborns don't. You are not in charge of protecting newborn children, but as Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commissioners, you should be concerned with protecting newborn wildlife.

Wolf pups and other canines, like domestic dogs, raccoons, all Montana rodent species examined, pigs, domestic cats, domestic livestock, birds, reptiles and amphibians were born with the same or very similar birth defects to the wild grazing animals and human newborns. Beginning in spring of 1995, all had a sudden significant prevalence of either underbite or male reproductive malformations or both. Rodents had only the male reproductive malformations and with birds, only the underbite (short upper bill) could be observed.

I sincerely hope that you will take this information into consideration before you allow the inhumane and unnecessary extermination of our beautiful and important wildlife species. Traps and snares are extremely nonselective and harmful to multiple non-target species. Chasing mother bears with hounds or killing any wild mothers and causing their young to die a slow death from dehydration or starvation is not at all what hunting is supposed to be about.

Montana Audubon would like to be on the record regarding the upcoming 2021-2022 wolf harvest and trapping regulation proposal. It is our mission is to promote the appreciation, knowledge and conservation of Montana's native birds, other wildlife, and natural ecosystems to safeguard biological diversity for current and future generations. We are an independent, state-wide non-profit representing almost 6,000 Montanans. We have worked to promote wildlife and habitat at the Montana Legislature since 1979 and we appreciate the opportunity to comment here.

Montana Audubon supports the 2021-2022 option of Limited New Tools for approval by the commission, a position that aligns with our opposition to the many proposals, including HB279, HB 224, HB 225, and HB 314, that mandated the use of these new "tools" for intentionally decreasing Montana's wolf population. Specifically, we support the implementation of:

- One license per wolf.
- Limiting trapping seasons from December 15 to February 28.
- Snaring only on public lands if it must be implemented. We are opposed to snaring.
- No night hunting.
- No baiting of traps allowed.
- Retain Quota Areas.

More generally, maintaining the Dec15-February 28 2021 season is important as Montana continues to try to manage wolves and other wildlife responsibly. We strongly advise against going past March with this date. We know with dry and mild winters, other large predators like grizzly bears are more at risk of interacting with passive traps. It's extremely important as Montana expands it's already liberal wolf harvest season that it works hard to track that harvest through, a one wolf, one license process, and that the Commission be given the opportunity to track wolf numbers through maintaining quotes and the ability to reconsider the season as needed. We support the maintenance of all protections for both the Canada Lynx and grizzly bear.

Our position is simple but firm, and we would request that you supported the Limited New Tools option in all cases. Thank you for the opportunity to comment.

I am writing to submit my concerns regarding the rules proposed to implement legislation signed by the Governor. First, I must state that I am a fourth generation Montanan and I am completely opposed to anti-wildlife bills that were pass out of our recent legislative session and signed by the Governor. I believe these actions are overreaching and unnecessary. I grew up in a Montana without wolves, because there weren't any; they'd all been killed years before. When wolves were reintroduced I was so proud of Montana's part in having wolves reintegrated into our ecosystem, and I was equally proud of the science the state was praised for employing in management of that reintroduction. I feel like this legislation and the proposed rules turns all the gain and the good on its head. If these proposals are adopted, Montana will lose its reputation for carefully thought out management, and it will be replaced with unethical and unnecessary practices that completely go against the notion of fair chase. I am specifically opposed to night hunting, snaring, even on private land, opposed to one license being allowed to harvest five wolves, baiting, and extending the season. I would like to remind the Commission these animals are the resources of all of us, not just the few who want to make money off of trapping and killing them. A license is pennies compared to the money made on pelts, and fifteen breeding pairs is not a population. As such, I urge the Commission to adopt rules that require checks on any trap every 24 hours at a MINIMUM, prohibit the use of any snares on any public lands, obtain written permission of a landowner for the use of snares on their land, require certification of anyone allowed to trap wolves or any animal. In addition the Commission must require that all snare have a diverter and relaxing lock, with a breakaway rating of 275lb, a stop for a minimum loop size of 10 inches and the bottom of the loop a minimum of 18 inches above the surface.

As stated in my comments above, I am opposed to a license allowing for more than one wolf to be trapped per certified trapper, and the number of traps and leg holds a trapper can set must be limited. Trappers should be required to keep current maps of everywhere they have set a trap (this is simply common sense), and power snare and drags on snares and traps should be prohibited.

Trappers should be required to post warnings on any block management lands that traps exist and have been set. The dates for trapping of wolves needs to be revised to be set between January 2 to February 28th to avoid trapping Grizzlies and upland game bird dogs.

Snare should be prohibited in high use areas of elk and deer. Snare and traps near any public use access must have a setback of at least 150 feet. Hikers and users of recreational areas should be provided warning at access points and trailheads that traps or snares are present. The skulls and hides of any wolves killed by traps or shot must be presented to FWP fresh, not frozen. Areas adjacent to national parks should have only 1 wolf kill allowed. Use of bait and night hunting should be strictly prohibited. All trapping of any non-targeted species must be tracked and reported, and the public must be informed and have access to reports detailing payments for reimbursement to hunting and killing wolves as established by SB 267.

I also wish to voice my opposition to the increase proposed in the trapping of River Otters. In your proposal you state that there is no evidence that the increase is warranted; that you are proposing the change based on anecdotal evidence. Are you kidding? I have reviewed many state rule proposals and I don't think once has a proposal been justified by such a statement; use science please, not the wishes and whims of trappers. Otters are often caught in traps meant for beavers and those numbers of trapped otters are not reflected in the official counts of otters killed by this method. Your numbers cannot be relied on for accuracy as a result of these methods of recordkeeping.

Beyond just common sense, we're in the middle of one of the worst droughts we've experienced. The land is parched, water is scarce in many areas, wildlife must survive in this situation and they are already stressed greatly beyond the norm. The FWP is supposed to work for everyone in the state, not just the less than 1% of the population who insist on trapping animals in order to kill them and make money. Director Worsech has stated that the incidental trapping of dogs would be addressed via Montana FWP Citizen Advisory Councils. I've seen no evidence anything is being done in this regard, and really, once your dog is trapped and wounded or dead, I don't think having your case reviewed by a Council is going to bring your dog back or address your anger, grief and anguish over having your animal family member die or be maimed in such a horrid manner. I hope my comments will be considered in the finalization of the rules you have proposed. Thank you for the opportunity to comment.

I am writing to comment on the wolf hunting and trapping regulations slated for discussion at the next commission meeting.

FWP's own research (FWP multi-year study of wolf-elk relations, released summer 2009) has demonstrated that the primary determinants of elk numbers are severity of winter, habitat conditions, hunting pressure and take, and quite variable effects of predators. However, the recent legislation using wolf reductions to improve elk populations is 180 degrees counter to your own study. Primary sources of deer and elk predation have been found to be bears preying on calves and fawns as well as mountain lion kills. Wolves were not found to be a primary factor. This begs the question why an expansion in methods of killing wolves is needed. Given your own work, and no other studies to indicate differently, there is no basis for expansion. These proposals put the desires of the roughly 5,000 licensed trappers in the state *above* the desires of the rest of the public that uses public lands. Particularly at risk are the hunting dogs of bird hunters (approximately 130,000 bird hunters licensed in the state). It doesn't take long to run into someone who has had a dog caught in a trap and no one deserves to go through that

tragedy. No one. For these reasons, I am writing to ask that you keep expansion of methods for take of wolves to the absolute minimum.

Please maintain the planned regulations to only allow wolf snaring on private lands only, with an abundant buffer around Yellowstone National Park.

Snares will capture many other animals other than wolves, including deer, elk, mountain lions, and bears. Please maintain the current requirement for reporting of all non-target captures in both foothold traps and snares. And how *will* you enforce this? There is zero incentive for a trapper to report incidental take.

Please adopt the latest start of the trapping and snaring season and end on Feb. 28. A later starting date will minimize trapping of bears.

Please do not allow either night hunting or baiting. An ethical hunter considers these methods unethical. Please do not allow use power-assisted snares that will drive every bird hunter to carry cable cutters to free their dog if trapped. Please require that wolf traps and snares be checked daily. Montana was once the gold standard for game and non-game wildlife management. These proposals, as well as the fatally flawed pheasant release proposal, tarnish our reputation for the foreseeable future.

So, let's talk pheasants briefly. Pheasants Forever, the national advocacy group, posted this at their website (https://www.pheasantsforever.org/BlogLanding/Blogs/Field-Notes/Stocking-Pheasants%E2%80%94Still-in-Demand,-Still-Futile.aspx [pheasantsforever.org])

In a study by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, researchers released banded and radio-collared wild birds (trapped elsewhere) and pen-raised birds in two areas in southern Idaho where wild bird numbers were low. The scientists also tested the effectiveness of trapping and removing magpies, skunks, coyotes, mink and other predators from the areas.

In a paper published in Wildlife Biology in 2009, the Idaho scientists reported that "wild female pheasants were seven times more likely to survive translocation to Oct. 1, 10 times more likely to survive to the nesting season, [and] eight times more productive." Predator control aided survival of wild roosters released, but didn't seem to help either wild or pen-raised hens. According to the study, "Low survival, poor productivity, and higher costs of spring--released pen--reared female pheasants strongly suggest that this is an inappropriate management tool for increasing pheasant numbers."

A South Dakota study published a decade earlier in The Journal of Wildlife Management showed similar results. Anthony Leif of the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks radio-collared and released 44 wild hens and 159 pen-raised hens in two areas in eastern South Dakota. While most wild hens survived through the study period, the pen-raised hens were easy pickings for predators. Additionally, the wild hens were ten times as successful at raising broods. Leif concluded, "Because of

low survival and reproductive rates, pen-reared hens should not be released in habitats containing wild pheasants."

So tell me why we must go forward this? Please do not waste my taxes in this way.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment. I hope you will give the most consideration to the public land users of this state, less the 5,000 trappers. Use the best available science of our agency <u>professionals.as</u> [professionals.as] the basis of your decisions.

I have lived in Missoula for 26 years. I hunt and fish. I am writing to oppose the new wolf regulations. Before I get into some details, I will address the complaints of low elk numbers in R1, where all of these new legislative bills originated. Our perception of where elk should be and how many there are is based on populations that developed during historically low predator numbers, due to their persecution over the past 100 plus years. Elk and deer are by nature grassland animals that occasionally use mountain habitats, where there are grassy meadows or valleys. Since the prairie was destroyed for agriculture and top predators were killed to near extirpation, and human hunting was regulated, deer and elk have been forced to live more in the mountains. Humans occupy most valleys and have converted most of the rich grassland habitat into ranch rangeland, replacing most winter habitat with grasses and hay fields that are worthless to ungulates in the winter. Habitat quality and quantity are the real issues with lower than desired elk and deer populations. As Chuck Jonkel taught me, habitat, habitat, habitat is always where our focus should be. Animals know how to live, but we must give them space. We have wisely allowed some predators to come back on the scene, and there has been a shift in elk and deer population numbers and how they use the landscape. We should expect hunting to be more difficult. It is not the job of FWP to make hunting easy or guarantee success. We should be focused on bringing back native grasslands to support elk and deer, not killing predators. Deer and Elk have lived successfully with predators for tens of thousands of years, and imbalances we see are due to our own actions, not any animal just trying to carry on in a radically changed ecosystem. R1 is the home of heavy, dense conifer forests, and it has never been a habitat that supports large elk herds, and so it is not reasonable to think that killing more wolves is going to cause a boom in elk numbers or distribution. Idaho has for decades had very liberal regulations around killing all kinds of predators in the Clearwater and Nez Perz forests, which are dense and heavy. There is still no significant increase in ungulated populations in those areas, because it is a habitat issue. The forest use to create good pockets of ungulate habitat with fire, but that is another issue entirely, or is it? It is all connected through habitat.

Due to the legislation recently passed, there will be more killing of wolves. As the commission, you have the power to ensure that we do not take an extreme approach to implementing these new measures. There should be mandatory 24 hours trap checks. Snares should be allowed only by written permission from a private landowner, and should require release devices, a 275lb breakaway, a stop for min. loop size of 10", and the bottom of the loop should be 18" above ground. Trapping Montana's public trust held wildlife is a privilege and should be treated as such in the regulations. Trappers should map where snares and leg hold traps are set and should be limited in number of traps set. No power snares or drag

lines on traps. Wolf trapping season should be from Jan to the end of Feb to avoid grizzly bear and black bear incidents in traps. Setbacks must remain in place to protect people and pets. Signs should be posted where trapping is happening. A one wolf quota should be established near national park boundaries and where elk and deer numbers are above quotas, allowing wolves to fulfill their role in the ecology of population control of ungulates and disease control, especially CWD. All non-target catches should be reported and a report on payments for wolves killed should be maintained.

Wolves play an important ecological role and should have a place on the landscape. They are smart and social. Have we learned nothing from our past extreme actions? We need to allow for some natural ecological function among the domination of the landscape humans have executed. Animals are trying live the same as they have for tens of thousands of years, and we came in and rearranged the landscape and habitats that animals depend on to benefit only us. Please allow these creatures to exist without constant persecution. Some management is required in the modern setting, but it does not have to be so extrem as some would like. Use your power wisely and do not cave to the loud voices of a few folks in R1. I request that swift fox trapping cease in Montana, due to low populations and fragmented habitat. The majority of Montanans do not agree with the new legislation to manage wolves. We look to the commissioners to use a science-driven, data-based approach to wildlife management and not to pander to the politicians and their agendas.

- 2) Inconsistent rationales for reducing wolf numbers. The legislation for wolf management was supposedly based on concerns that elk numbers were declining as a result of wolf predation. Yet, at the same time the commission is tasked with managing the overabundance of elk. It can't be both ways. And the relationship between wolves and elk numbers is not a direct correlation. Stop unlimited and unreported trapping of beaver for 5.5-9 months out of the year. All trapped beaver must be reported.

The following trapping regulations affect me in the ways listed below:

- 1. Limit the number of snares and leg hold traps that a trapper can use.
- 2. Prohibit power snares and the use of drags on traps and snares.
- 3. Because I walk and hike and often have a dog with me there should be trapping warning signage at trailheads and areas where many people recreate.
- 4. Setbacks of a minimum of 150' for all public roads for snares and traps should be enforced.
- 5. Snares for wolves should be only one for a certified trapper.
- 6. Dates for wolf trapping season should be January 2nd to February 28 to keep from trapping pregnant wolves and bears.
- 7. No snares on public land.

- 8. No bait or night hunting for wolves.
- 9. There must be 24 hour trap checks so the suffering is lessened.
- 10. One wolf per license.
- 11. A must is to require reporting all non-target catches.

Since the 2009 delisting, Wolves of the Rockies (WotR) has attempted to work with the Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks (MTFWP) Commission, and state decision makers to find common ground on wolf management issues. Although we never fully saw eye to eye, it was a science-based process in which non-consumptive voices were heard and often acted upon. The 2020-2021 legislative cycle has shown that this process has drastically changed. For example, accurate wolf population data has not been utilized in drafting current wolf proposals. Varying population numbers of 1200, 1150, 980, and 830 were presented by MTFWP during the recent legislative session. MTFWP has stated that visually counting wolves is not necessary with wolf populations at > +1000. WotR asks the simple and rational question-how can the Commission draft science-based wolf management proposals calling for a drastic population reduction without accurate numbers? The fact is- it cannot. We strongly recommend a visual count before proposals are implemented. Another inaccuracy put forth by decision makers relates to Montana's elk population and how it relates to wolves. Decision makers insist that elk numbers are down when in fact numbers have increased from 95,000 in 1995 to 135,000 in 2018. As a result, landowners have complained that there are too many elk so MTFWP introduced shoulder seasons to reduce numbers. WotR strongly opposes shoulder seasons as they cause more stress on wolves and other wildlife. Scientific studies have shown that wolves actually support balanced ungulate populations by culling the sick resulting in healthier, balanced populations. The hunting community, however, states that there is a shortage of elk. WotR asks another simple and rational question- which is it? Too few or too many elk? We believe that many elk have moved onto private land where they cannot be hunted. Access is the problem, not wolves. In addition, MTFWP commissioners and state decision makers have continually indicated their unwillingness to address non-consumptive concerns including but not limited to collateral damage to lynx, grizzly bears and pets caused by trapping and snaring. In fact, the commission has deliberately thwarted Montanans from gaining access to wolf information by discontinuing Wolf Weekly, an important source for state wolf information. Finally, the Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks leaderships rejection of the "wolf stamp" in October 2020, despite public support, further shows an unwillingness to work with non-consumptive stakeholders. Clearly, the Commission continues to prioritize special interest groups such as Montana Outfitters and Guides and supports the commercialization of Montana's wildlife in direct contradiction to The North American Model of Conservation. With these points in mind, WotR and its 185,000 supporters stand in direct opposition to the entire 2021- 2022 Wolf Hunting and Trapping Regulations Proposal and strongly encourage MTFWP to establish a 24 hour snare and trap check requirement. I wish to comment on the wolf hunting and trapping regulations to be addressed at your upcoming meeting. I am a wildlife biologist with over 40 years working in this field, and also a past-president of The Wildlife Society- the international professional society for wildlife biologists.

As I requested of you in a previous email, using the best available science as a foundation for wildlife management decisions is a guiding action that cannot be overstated. While science does not provide all of the answers especially when dealing with social issues, ignoring the information provided by science as a basis for making decisions is just wrong.

The recent bills about the need for reductions in numbers of wolves to improve big game populations is an example of wildlife management recommendations without any scientific foundation. These bills were based solely on perceptions of some unsuccessful hunters mixed with the desires of a small but enthusiastic and influential group of trappers to expand their sport. Your agency's own research has demonstrated that the primary determinants of big game (deer and elk) numbers are severity of winter weather, overall habitat conditions, hunting pressure and take, and in certain situations a minor effect from predators. However, the primary predators affecting deer and elk have been found to be bears preying on very young calves and fawns followed by kills by mountain lions. Wolves were not found to be a large factor, although they have been shown to cause shifts in elk behavior and habitat use. Some of these shifts may result in elk in particular moving out of areas where hunters may have previously found them, but not in population sizes. So why is an expansion in methods of killing wolves needed? From a scientific wildlife management standpoint, it isn't.

That said, the legislation does suggest that you provide some expansion of methods for take of wolves. I recommend that you keep this to the bare minimum. In particular, I am concerned about snaring, especially on public lands. I had a dog killed in a coyote snare while bird hunting on public land this last December, and would not wish this tragic event on anyone else. While you have nearly no ability to control MDOL predatory animal trapping, you can regulate what is allowed for wolf snaring. I strongly recommend that you maintain your planned regulations to only allow wolf snaring on private lands to minimize conflicts with other public land users including bird hunters, hikers, and skiers.

As stated in testimony on the bills from a number of wildlife professionals, with snares you will see a large number of non-target captures of animals other than wolves that will include the big game animals the proponents seek to protect by killing more wolves, as well as mountain lions, bears (if the early season dates are approved), and many other species. I strongly recommend maintaining your current requirement for reporting of all non-target captures in both foothold traps and snares. Further, you should require that all incidental capture include information on the outcome of the capture to the animal.

I recommend you adopt the later start of the trapping and snaring season and ending on Feb. 28. We heard from trappers that pelts harvested later in the season are not in good shape, so why extend the season when there is no biological reason for doing so as discussed above? The later starting season will minimize the potential for non-target capture of bears, and will reduce potential conflicts with other users including bird hunters. I would like to see the trapping/snaring season start Jan. 1 rather than Dec. 15 to further reduce conflicts, but you have not listed this as an option.

I also recommend that you do not allow dangerous night hunting or use of baiting that I consider unethical methods. These methods are a social question rather than a biological question but will only further build resentment in the public towards hunting and trapping if allowed. The bag limit should be 5, one per license. Power-assisted snares (such as the one that killed my valuable hunting dog and family companion) should not be allowed on wolf snares. These locking snares are very difficult to release without specially purchased heavy duty cable cutters. With the expected capture of many non-target animals, power-assisted snares will also make possible release of these animals much more difficult. You indicate that power-assisted snares should not be allowed on public lands which I strongly agree with but I recommend not allowing them at all for use on wolves even on private lands. And again, I strongly support not allowing use of snares for wolves on public lands.

Finally, wolf traps and snares should have a requirement they be checked daily. This is not an unreasonable requirement and many other states already require this for all trapping, let alone wolf trapping. While ethical trappers will do this without regulation, not requiring this only adds to the dislike of much of the public towards trapping.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment. I hope you give strong consideration to the potential impacts of changes to regulations on the approximately 130,000 bird hunters licensed in the state as compared to the approximately 5,000 licensed trappers who advocate for their desire for expanded trapping/snaring. I again encourage you to use the best available science produced by wildlife professionals including those in your department as a foundation for your decisions.
