By way of introduction, I am 72 years old, have been hunting deer for 60 years and elk for 50 years. I am a former big game hunting outfitter and guide (New Mexico and Colorado), a wildlife biologist by training (my Ph.D. was on elk population dynamics), and have lived and hunted in Montana since 1988. I am also a former Montana Fish and Wildlife Commissioner (2013-2017). I was very disheartened to see the draconian anti-wolf bills passed in the recent Montana legislative session, specifically HB 224, HB 225, and SB 314. There is absolutely no sound biological rational for these bills. Montana already has a very liberal wolf hunting and trapping season, with several hundred wolves harvested each year. And although wolves do have localized impacts on deer and elk populations, Montana's overall elk and deer populations are thriving and not in danger of being decimated by wolf predation. Wolves are simply an easy scapegoat for unsuccessful hunters! Additionally, I believe wolves and other large predators can help mitigate a real threat to our deer and elk populations—Chronic Wasting Disease. The positive role that wolves and other predators play in helping mitigate CWD and other wildlife diseases needs to be given more attention. I realize the Fish and Wildlife Commission has limited opportunities to minimize implementation of the very ill-conceived wolf legislation. However, I appreciate the fact that FWP staff have developed three proposed Wolf Season options for the Commission to consider. That means there is no credible scientific basis that utilizing the Maximum New Tools Option (MNT) option will risk relisting, or create any of the doomsday predictions by the animal rights and anti-hunting and ant-trapping community. Considerations on the proposal: Adopt the MNT option and snaring requirements and eliminate quotas and restrict baiting and night hunting in WMU's 313/316. I believe raising the height of the bottom of the snare loop to 20 or 22 inches above the surface would avoid the potential for non-target lynx catches and produce more captures of mature wolves. Retain the other snare equipment and requirements in the proposal except consider allowing snaring on public lands in low recreational use areas perhaps derived from the trapping setback findings. The MNT coincides with many of the core recommendations of the approved Gray Wolf Conservation and Management Plan. Some examples for justification of the MNT from the Plan include: • An adaptive approach will help MFWP implement its wolf program. • Management actions will be evaluated in light of prevailing conditions or extenuating circumstances. • If a local prey population are significantly impacted by wolf predation the Department may reduce wolf numbers. • If a local prey population is significantly impacted by wolf predation in conjunction with other environmental factors, FWP would consider reducing wolf pack size. •

Wolf management actions would be paired with other corrective management actions to reduce ungulate mortality or enhance recruitment. • Concurrent management efforts for wolves and ungulates would continue until the prey population rebounded. The most compelling justification for reduction of wolves by adopting the MNT is the low recruitment rates in several local areas within regions 1 and 2 where there is little to no resilience as stated by FWP, and as I have witnessed. If the triggers to initiate a commission quorum on harvest and non-target captures are put in place as sideboards then adoption of the MNT has sufficient safeguards to maintain a viable wolf population. The annual wolf season setting framework allows future changes based on the "Learn and improve as we go" objective that has been a tenet of all wolf season proposals. I urge the commission to follow legislative intent of HB 224, HB 225, and SB 314 and approve the proposal as outlined in these comments. Thank you, Keith Kubista Stevensville Montana "

We also must carry vise grips and snare cutters during trapping season, to facilitate releasing them, if they were to be caught in a leghold trap or snare. Increasing the length of hunting season or expanding the use of snares onto public land would increase the danger to our dogs, and those of other forest users, while benefitting the few who hunt and trap wolves. Wolves are and essential part of the ecosystem, and targeting them as in the other alternatives is not an appropriate goal. Elk numbers are at or over objectives in all regions and in most hunting districts, according to FWP numbers, so any increase as a consequence of reduced wolf predation would be a detriment to the environment and ecosystem. In our area, many elk winter in their historic wintering grounds near the Bitterroot River, much of which is private property, which may reduce hunting success, but reducing wolf numbers is unlikely to affect this tendency of the ungulates. Besides the reasons mentioned above, allowing much more liberal wolf hunting and trapping will negatively impact tourism. Anything else is damaging to our values and the state's primary tourism economy. Where I live, in Gardiner, MT, I personally witnessed tourists boycott the town in 2012-13, when MT had no quotas and allowed a huge take of wolves. We really only felt heard by MTFWP Commissioners in 2019 and 2020, when they finally voted to keep the quotas low enough to make a difference. 2.1 oppose the quota of 450 wolves for the hunting season, taking 50% of our wolf population. That is killing too many wolves. MTFWP is abandoning their own science-based cap of killing no more than 29% of the wolf population. This has been FWP's stated goal for years, based on a peer-reviewed paper, "Population Dynamics and Harvest Characteristics of Wolves in the Central Brooks Range, Alaska." At this rate, MT will deserve the federal re-listing of wolves This level of slaughter disrupts the natural social behavior of wolves. 3. under the ESA.

Instead of setting up a series of emergency meetings, fix the regulations. Please restrict hunting and trapping to the minimum the law allows, so that you do not need emergency meetings. SO MANY PROVISIONS FOR SO MANY KINDS OF EMERGENCY MEETINGS IS A RED FLAG that you are enacting regulations that you know seriously endanger and harass our wolf population, and endanger lynx, bear, and all kinds of other wildlife and domestic dogs. 4.

I oppose all trapping and the use of snares. Please, get more restrictive: allow snares on private land only where wolves have proved to depredate regularly and have evaded removal too successfully. 5. I oppose all baiting and night hunting. But Montana's wolf management has been broken for a long time. Here's what you are not looking at: • We should manage wolves the way we manage cougars. MTFWP currently has one of the best cougar management plans in the West. Lions are managed in a way that has allowed the population to grow to 5000 cougars in MT. Cougars take four times the numbers of elk in the Bitterroot (see FWP data) and depredate as much as wolves. Why do we tolerate them better?

• Managing a wolf population eco-region by eco-region, with their denning seasons in mind, would protect wolves in high tourism areas like Gardiner and kill more wolves in areas where elk or deer may be stressed by other factors. • We have record numbers of elk in the state. The problem with elk numbers is a problem with wolf numbers—too few wolves. Killing wolves to help elk populations is a joke, with no science to support it. If anything, ranchers in Paradise Valley in Park County, where wolf hunters essentially wiped out its wolf population in the last two years, now complain about overpopulation of elk. • Wolves are the best managers of elk that we have. A puny predator, the wolf is not out for the big rack: in much of S/W Montana, elk counts show an imbalance between prime aged bull elk and cows. In Yellowstone, just over the border where there is no hunting, the bull-cow ratio is healthy. ("Northern Elk Herd Classification Report" from the past several years.) Also elk and wolves are

- 624. Given that the 2020 level of harvest resulted in a reduction in the wolf population, the minimal tools seem like the best of three options, if you indeed want to reduce the population size. It is not clear from the online documents, if something less than the limited option can be considered. For example, why does the limited option not prohibit snaring? Keeping the 2020 harvest limits is also an option? Not clear how the 2020 limits differed from 2019, which maintained relatively static population levels. Maintaining the current population level would better meet the goals of recognizing wolves as an important component of the ecosystem and supporting wolf viewing in support of the tourism, likely an important component of Montana's economy. A harvest limit of 450 wolves is excessive. A much lower harvest of 328 in 2020 resulted in a reduced population. Reducing the population too much or too quickly, will ultimately result in reduced opportunity for hunters and trappers, and seems short-sighted. Maintaining a higher wolf population would be better for long term opportunity and sustained yield. Also provide a better hunting experience, as the number of people participating would be lower. This would also better meet the MFWP commitment to maintaining tri-state wolf population at numbers sufficient to preclude reclassification of threatened or endangered. The harvest limit should be set annually, based on harvest the previous season and population levels. Maintaining the population at the minimum of 15 packs per the recovery plan would not be sufficient to allow for interstate dispersion. Nor provide a sufficient buffer in the case of habitat loss or disease. One wolf per hunting license should be maintained. The hunting bag limit should be retained at one since it appears there is not much demand for a higher bag limit.

Don't increase it five-fold. Per the Montana Wolf Management plan, MFWP intends to honor the diverse perspectives and interests of our citizens and the national public. The national public clearly cares about wolves and would like to see them restored to historic habitat in sufficient numbers to support minimum viable populations and to offset habitat loss, disease, or other issues. Night hunting is a safety issue and should not be authorized. Low light levels make if more difficult to determine what you are shooting at and to hit your target. Night hunting will increase the amount of unintentional take of other species and wounded animals. It will also facilitate poaching and make enforcement more difficult. I am commenting today to urge the Commission to use your discretion and authority to restore the public?s trust in Montana?s wildlife management, and to take a measured and prudent approach with the state?s 2021/2022 wolf hunting and trapping regulations proposal. Grey Wolves are a native keystone species; they play an important ecological role in balancing natural systems and reducing the spread of fatal wildlife diseases such as Chronic Wasting Disease by culling sick animals from herds. Additionally wolves in the Northern Rockies are key to re-establishing wolf populations in the Pacific Northwest. Millions of people come every year to the Rockies for the chance to see a wolf in the wild.

We urge you to preserve Montana?s historically reasoned and science-based approach to wildlife management, which unfortunately regressed back to the 1800s with a host of extreme bills targeted at wolves and other species in the recent legislative session. As members of the Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission, you have the opportunity and responsibility to restore public trust and to continue a rational, science-based approach to wolf management.

Specifically, we urge you to severely limit snaring, which threatens not only wolves but also threatened grizzly bears and Canada lynx and other wildlife on both public and private lands, as well as pets. We urge you to heed the cautions expressed by Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP) wildlife professionals in regard to incidental capture of grizzly bears in snares and human safety threats, and urge you not to extend the hunting and trapping season in either the fall or spring. Please do not allow unethical measures including baiting and spotlighting of wolves, or the killing of an unlimited number of wolves by a single license holder. All of these measures destroy the public?s trust in Montana?s

management of wolves and other wildlife and are antithetical to fair-chase hunting principles. We urge you not to eliminate the wolf quotas in hunting districts adjacent to Montana?s National Parks. Lastly, as FWP has reported, there has already been a 15-20% decline in the wolf population as a result of increased wolf mortality in last year?s hunting and trapping season. My name is Glenn Schenavar,

I'm an avid sportsman and represent sportsmen from Montana; I am also chairman for The Sanders County Chapter of F4WM. F4WM has 4,423 members in 38 states.

I know this is a highly political issue so I have decided to stick with the facts.

There has been a lot of negative impact on ungulates in region 1, 2 and 3.

Montana has been above the threshold of 15 breeding pairs of wolves since 2005. Wolf numbers have been 6 to 8 times above that threshold since 2009 to the present.

Region 1 holds about 45% of the wolf numbers with 80 packs and 500 wolves.

Region 2 holds 25% with 50 packs and 300 wolves.

Region 3 has 20% with 35 packs and 215 wolves.

In Region 1 alone according to FWP biologists, each wolf kills 20 Elk per year. Take 500 wolves times 20 and that is 10,000 elk per year.

Region 1 has taken the brunt of that out of control wolf population that has left the backcountry of western Montana null and void of ungulate populations.

We need to get predator numbers down in regions 1, 2 and 3. The Legislation that passed gives sportsmen the tools to reduce predation and let the ungulate population recover in areas negatively impacted by wolves.

FWP proposed recommendations eliminate regions 1,2and 3 from the new legislation because of Grizzly bear and lynx protection zones. This is not sound management.

Idaho has been trapping and snaring in grizzly and lynx protective zones for 11 years and has 0 incidents with grizzly or lynx caught in traps or snares. So this is a false narrative which I believe was concocked to limit wolf harvest.

Montana wolf management plan calls for maintaining a population of a numerical estimate of 282 wolves. We have over 1,000 in the state. Our Montana State Constitution guarantees that FWP has to manage ALL WILDLIFE and that includes wolves.

I feel they have neglected their duty to reduce wolf numbers to let the ungulates recover in regions negatively impacted by wolves.

Dear Commissioner Robinson

My comments are regarding the proposed wolf regulations that MTFWP put forward. My comments are based on my status which I would consider as a major stakeholder. As I am landowner and sportsman in region 2. My ranch that I lease out for summer pasture is near the Idaho border and since the wolves have been on the landscape it has had a major impact on cattle grazing. Also, the good elk hunting and excellent whitetail hunting has dwindled. This wolf activity on my ranch demanded action and I began trapping wolves when it became legal. After many years and lots of study I have become fairly efficient at wolf trapping, therefore I feel I can comment on that subject with experience and knowledge.

First of all, as I look at the proposed regulations even at the maximum new tools, I do not believe that MTFWP are following the intent of the laws that the legislature passed this past session. Here in western Montana, we need maximum pressure on wolves to bring back hunting to a level that is even 75% of what it was before wolves. I also know that I or anyone in the future will not see the abundance of wild game that I witnessed before the Canadian Gray Wolf introduction. I am only going to comment on maximum new tools as I consider those are at the very least, we should look at for regulations.

Wolf licenses bag limit of 10 with one license. Fine will allow the very few who are expert trappers to do the work that most others cannot accomplish. I trap all of the present season with 2 dozen wolf traps and I believe my best year was 3 wolves.

Seasons definitely need to be expanded to Dec. 1 to March 15th. As far as the Lynx restriction goes that should not even be considered. A properly adjusted wolf trap has a pan tension set to 10lbs as per regulation will amply protect and animal the weight of a lynx. A snare set to 24 inches above the ground will also protect lynx. The proposed height of 18 inches should be raised. The existing season was set to reduce wolf trapping success by a short season in the worse possible conditions. Bears are not out the first 2 weeks of December and could be extended to March 15th without any by catch. I do consider that snaring should be considered only on private land as inexperienced trappers will have by-catch not to protect the public. The only problem with private land only as it would set a precedent that may cause a problem later when expansion of wolves in some public lands and that

131

tool could not be used to protect wildlife resources.

Use of baits statewide as it is used all over to hunt a variety of predators. Eliminate Quotas desperately needed as that is where hunting of big game has been devastated. No need to have any kind of panic if 450 wolves are killed as there are many more wolves out there than is estimated. MTFWP always says that their estimate is a minimum and there is 15% more that. I would say 30% more than MTFWP wolf population estimates. Could be adjusted to game animals if I catch a coyote not going to bother reporting.

Discuss it if you wish but a foothold trap will not hold a mature grizzly, I talked to several serious trappers in Canada that trap among grizzlies all the time. One of them held a yearling one time. An important note here to me would in most instances that you not use a drag for your trap but have it secured with a ground anchor or chained to a tree. I have had numerous deer, elk and moose set my traps off and they pull right out when anchored securely. A bear especially a grizzly wouldn't even be bothered by the temporary bracelet. If a small bear is caught release it with the help of a FWP employee who can dart it get any information you want, collar it and add to your data base.

Expanded wolf seasons explained sufficiently in previous statements above.

Wolf snaring on private land explained sufficiently above. Wolf snaring required equipment. All good except I would consider a change of minimum height of bottom of loop at 24 inches. Yes, wolf trapping seasons should be reviewed annually. In closing Idaho has more liberal regulations by far than I am suggesting and their wolf population is still well above the minimum required wolf population set by their agreement with the federal plan. I am willing to answer any questions you may have or clarifications at

any time.

I am totally aghast with how extreme the state of Montana has become. I was in the state for 9 days around Christmas, 9 days in mid April and I will be there for 14 days late July into August. Montana is truly my second home. These proposals to literally slaughter a social, intelligent and ecologically important animal is asinine. So, accordingly, please:

1. Maintain the current quotas of 2 wolves in wolf management units 313 and 2 wolves

in unit 316 near Yellowstone NP and the current quotas near Glacier. In the Gardiner and

Silver Gate gateway communities, a healthy wolf populations is the highest value,

economically, for research, and because people want wild wolves in the ecosystem. I stay in

this area and contribute to the local economy

2. Support fixing the regulations instead of setting up a series of emergency meetings.

Don't allow any trapping at all in areas where there are lynx and grizzly bears, and restrict all other trapping with snares.

I oppose the quota of 450 wolves for the hunting season. This is killing too many wolves. This plan would take 50% of the population. That is not wildlife management. That is slaughtering to appease special interests. I also oppose trapping and the use of snares. They are cruel and banned in many areas. Lastly, I oppose all baiting and night hunting. Simply killing wolves does not increase elk or save cattle. Elk populations in the state exceed FWP's goals in nearly every region, AND depredations are low, averaging a measely 60 domestic animals per year, including cattle.

Wolves should be managed the way cougars are: the FWP new plan for cougars has allowed the population to grow to 5,000 in MT. Managing wolves this way would protect wolves in high tourism areas like Gardiner and kill more wolves in areas where elk or deer may be stressed by many factors. (climate change drought; habitat loss; multiple predators in one area —humans, wolves, cougars, bears).

The wolf season needs to be shorter. MTFWP has been managing wolves as vermin, and this is abandoning the North American Model of Wildlife Management. MTFWP allows killing of wolves Sept-Nov, when the pelts are useless. It is considered wasteful and unethical. MTFWP is abandoning its own science-based cap of killing no more than 29% of the wolf population. This was FWP's stated goal, based on a peer-reviewed paper, "Population Dynamics and Harvest Characteristics of Wolves in the Central Brooks Range, Alaska." MTFWP's Wolf Management Measurable Objective #3 is to maintain relationships "with hunters and livestock producers and other stakeholders." Wildlife conservationists, wildlife watchers, and wildlife research should be named stakeholders. MTFWP should manage wildlife for all Montanans. Many environmentalists, wildlife guides, and wildlife watchers (including myself) feel unheard.

RE: Wolf hunting season proposals

Dear Chair Robinson and Commissioners,

The Montana Wildlife Federation supports fair chase, science-based, sustainable, and ethical hunting and trapping of gray wolves. However, the wolf season proposals in front of the Commission generated by politicians in the legislature are not ethical, science-based, or sustainable and violate Montana standards of fair chase. On top of all this, these wolf hunts are not needed given current robust herds of deer and elk across Montana.

The Commission only needs to look at the data provided by biologists within Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks to see that there is no need for extreme, anti-wolf hunting seasons to be implemented. Montana's existing wolf season is working, with a strong harvest of wolves throughout the six-month season that has reduced and now stabilized Montana's wolf population. The current hunting and trapping regulations are meeting our big game management needs, have reduced depredations on livestock, and have stabilized wolf numbers while ensuring that the wolf population remains healthy and recovered.

MWF helped write the 2011 delisting rider that restored state management of wolves. We did that on the assumption that Montana FWP, through the Commission, would use science-based facts to manage wolves, maintain sustainable and ethical hunting and trapping of wolves, and look out for the best interest of Montana's wildlife resources. These legislative proposals do none of those things. The legislative direction on wolves is based on misinformation, nonsense, and anti-predator hysteria and amounts to an all-out war on wolves at a time when Montana is aiming to reduce elk numbers.

The elk data speaks for itself, despite the fact that FWP did not take a stance on the numerous bills that are driving this. Much of the debate around wolves and elk numbers was driven by Region 1, in northwestern Montana. Yet the elk herds there are largely within the objective called for in the statewide Elk Management Plan. See the attached chart from FWP of elk counts by hunting districts.

The elk herd in the Clark Fork River Valley, around Thompson Falls, is within the objective. Hunting District 121 has an objective of 1,355 elk, with a range of 1,084 to 1,626. The most recent count, from 2019, was 1,418 elk. And the three districts in Region 1 listed as below objective for elk, HDs 100, 104, and 109/110, haven't had elk counted in over a decade.

In the six hunting districts in the Thompson Falls area including districts 104, 121, 123, 124, 200 and 201, the 2019 total elk objective for these six districts was 2,975 elk. The most recent count by FWP for these six districts was 3,210 elk, or 107 percent of the elk objective. There is no documented problem with low elk numbers and no information that indicates that wolves are threatening healthy elk numbers in western Montana.

This legislative session saw extreme rhetoric that claimed that wolves are dramatically reducing elk numbers. Yet FWPs own data shows the opposite, and the agency failed to show up and counter that anti-predator hysteria with facts derived from its own professional staff.

We urge this Commission to use its discretion to implement a reasonable wolf hunting package that allows for ethical hunting of the species while allowing wolves to play their important role in functioning, healthy ecosystems. Pursuing the nonsensical direction from the Legislature to drive wolf populations to the edge of extinction in Montana using unethical and extreme measures is likely to result in the loss of state authority to manage wolves. Please don't let that happen.

Montana 2020 Elk Counts

Elk are counted in winter or spring by aircraft. It is not possible to count all elk in a hunting district and elk plan objectives are based on "Observed Elk", which may be elk observed on trend areas in some cases. Counting elk is an inexact exercise subject to a multitude of weather and timing variables and elk movements between hunting districts. Therefore, counts in some years may not accurately reflect elk numbers and better counts from previous years are reported. In 2020, several scheduled surveys were unable to be completed due to constraints from the COVID-19 virus.
