



Background: Season structures and hunting district boundaries are adopted biennially by the commission for most game species. The proposed changes to upland game bird, turkey, and migratory bird seasons are described in the attached upland game bird, turkey, and migratory bird season summary and presented in detail for commission action within the regulation mockup. Sage-grouse harvest regulations are informed by the Sage-Grouse Adaptive Harvest Management Plan. Per that plan, the department will recommend a closure to hunting if the population counts in a harvest management zone (HMZ) are ≥45 percent below long-term average for three consecutive years. Counts were below that threshold in 2022 and 2023 in HMZ 3 (southeast MT−see map at end of this document). If they fall below that threshold following spring 2024 lek counts, the department recommends that HMZ 3 should be closed to hunting. The commission is considering all regulations and descriptions of boundaries for the 2024 and 2025 upland game bird, turkey, and migratory bird seasons, whether a change is proposed or not. All other regulations and descriptions of boundaries will remain unchanged unless addressed by the commission.

Public Involvement Process and Results: Public input was solicited through 34 public meetings during June and July 2023 where concepts for biennial season setting were discussed. Public comment was solicited for a four-week period following the Dec. 14, 2023, commission meeting. Seven hybrid virtual meetings were held (one in each region) between Oct. 30 and Nov. 10, 2023, to answer questions about proposals. Written public comments received during the comment period will be posted online and provided to commissioners at least two weeks prior to the February commission meeting.

Alternatives and Analysis: The department presented concepts for discussion for each species during June and July. Based on public feedback and legal analysis, the department refined the concepts and developed proposals for commission action.

Alternative A: The commission may approve the department's recommendation as presented.

<u>Alternative B</u>: The commission may amend the department's recommendation on any aspect of season structure, quota, or hunting district or on aspects of the regulations that are not proposed for change.

Agency Recommendation and Rationale: The department recommends the commission approve the proposed 2024 and 2025 hunting regulations and district boundaries as presented by the department and as detailed in the attached mockup. The department also requests the commission approve closing HMZ at o sage-grouse hunting if the 2024 lek counts for that HMZ are ≥45 percent below long-term average. Any aspect unchanged from 2023 season will remain in effect for 2024 and 2025, except where affected by routine calendar rotations.

Falconry hours: One-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset of the hunting season. Year-round sunrise/sunset tables are available on the FWP website. A 2023 Upland Game Bird License is valid for falconry until March 31, 2024. Falconers hunting in the month of March 2024 must have purchased their 2023 Upland Game Bird License no later than Feb. 29, 2024. A current valid Upland Game Bird License is required to hunt with falconry.

(MCA 87-6-401, CR) All other means of taking are prohibited.








Upland Game Bird Surveys Sharp-tailed Grouse






Upland Game Bird Surveys Sharp-tailed Grouse




Sage-grouse Habitat Management Zones






Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Effort – Total Hunter Days






Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Effort – Average Hunting Days per Hunter




Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Effort – Sharp-tailed Grouse






Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Effort – Sage Grouse






Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Effort – Pheasant






Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Effort – Hungarian Partridge






Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Effort – Turkey (Spring)






Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Harvest — Sharp-tailed Grouse






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




Upland Game Bird Surveys Hunter Harvest – Hungarian Partridge


